## SUPERSTITION ABOUT BEES.

Curious superstition prevail in England as to the relation of bees and their owners. A writer in Cassel's Magazine mentions several of these faucies as follows:

"All of 'em dead, sir-all the thirteen What a pity it is !?? "What a pity, Mrs-? Who is

dead ?" "The bees, to be sure, sir. Mrs. Bwhen she buried her husband, forgot to

give the bees a bit of mourning, and now, sir, they all be dead, though the hive be pretty nigh full of honey. What a pity it is folks will be so forget-

Mrs --- continued to explain that whenever the owner of part of a hive of bees died, it was requisite to have a little bit of black stuff on the hive ; otherwise the bees would follow the example of their owner.

Mrs. ----'s husband, who listened while this scrap of folk-lore was being communicated by his wife, now added : My wife, sir, be always talking a lot of nonsenses, sir, but this about the bees is true, for I seed it myself."

This custom of putting the hives in mourning is very common, and is strictly adhered to, from an apprehension of the omission being attended with fatal consequences.

At Cherry-Burton, on a death in the family, a scarf of black crape is applied to each hive on the occasion of the funeral, and pounded funeral biscuit soaked in wine is placed at the entrance to

This gives it its superiority as a leavening power over soda and cream of tartar when used alone, and has induced its use as a supplement to these articles. A small quantity of the ammonia in the dough is effective in producing bread that will be lighter, sweeter, and more wholesome than that risen by any other leavening agent. When it is acted upon by the COMBS. heat of baking the leavening gas that raises the dough is liberated. In this act it uses itself up, as it were : the am-monia is entirely diffused, leaving no trace of the residuum whatever. The light, fluffy, flaky appearance, so desirable in biscuits, etc., and is sought after by professional cooks, is said to be imagent


