LAW FOR FARMERS.

Some time since we gave an article on this subject. The country is full of advertisers who prey upon two classes distinctly. First, those who believe that all newspapers are liars, and second, that those who subscribe for the paper that is sold for the least money without reference to the reading matter it contains. Among the most successful swindlers are those who tempt, by a promissory note, for some swindle they have to sell, either drawn in such a manner that it may be altered or separable, or else under the pretense that it will not be presented until the article is tested. A good authority says:

A promissory note is a written agreement to pay a certain sum of money at a certain time. It must be definite and unconditional. It is therefore in the nature of money; being negotiable, and where payable to bearer, the property in it passes by the mere delivery of the paper on which it is written. It is not subject to all the defenses that are good as against other contracts. For example, it is generally good in the hands of an innocent holder, though the maker of it had lost it, or had been stolen, or obtained from him by fraud. This may be the case, even though it had been altered or "raised," as where I give my note signed in blank to a person, authorizing him to fill in a certain amount, as \$10, and he fills in a larger amount as \$100, and sells it to an innocent purchaser. I must pay the larger amount for I was who permitted the fraud to be committed; and an old maxim of the law holds that were one or two innocent persons to suffer from the wrongful act of a third, the loss must be borne by the one who enabled such third person to occasion it. The justice of this is obvious, and any sensible man will not be so stupid as to protect, in the largest degree, the rights of bona fide holders of negotiable instruments, which form part of the currency of the country, and if subject to all the defenses of other written contracts would be deprived of their main value.

Our advice is never to give a note unless written in the ordinary form, and you should know perfectly the contents thereof. The number of farmers who have been perpetuated on the farms of Western States and Territories by patent right men and worthless agricultural machinery agents, should be sufficient excuse for you to have nothing to do with men, especially in important transactions, who cannot satisfy your banker, lawyer or merchant that they are all right.

Another fraud is that of conveyance. The following decision is a case in point. Where a party conveys his property to a third person, and judgment is outstanding against him, the rights of his creditors, and the fraud is participated in by his purchaser, his title will not be protected, or other creditors will have consideration. Williams vs. Nachenheim, Sup. Court of Iowa.

So, again, when a note is executed by two or more parties, any alteration in it without the consent of all who signed the alteration was entirely honest and with no fraudulent intent, will be deemed a material one. Graighard vs. McHenry, Sup. Court, Pa., 39 Leg. Intell., 289.

In relation to mortgages there always has been and always will be difficulties. A careful man will never mortgage his home except as a last resort to raise money for some necessary purpose. To the connection a peculiar system of mortgaging farms in Switzerland will be interesting: A farmer may borrow of a third party more successfully, and the simple record in an official book showing their order. If he fails to pay, a successor is found for him by beginning at the bottom of the list of debtors, and calling on each in his order to assume the debt, and manage the farm, or step aside and lose his claim.

A SHAKING MOUNTAIN.—About four months ago a number of miners exploring El Monte Amargo, the Ritter mountains in Northern Chile. Near the top of the mountain they found something of which they had heard marvelous stories—the eye of the gold. This mine of stoeic many was extended to the point of the whole party. Evening had crept on and it was too late to descend, so the Californians lighted a fire under a rock near the summit there to pass the night. A furious wind blowing from the neighboring desert of Atacama. Suddenly the wind dropped, an unnatural calm and silence followed. Then came a confused murmur as if a distant, angry crowd of people, swelling to a grinding, crushing sound. A slight shiver ran through the mountain, succeeded by a more positive rocking motion. The men got upon their feet as quickly as possible, but in another moment all were shaken down. One of the prospectors says that the mountain seemed to sink beneath them. A heavy roar prevailed all space, and Monte Amargo belched like the wind-stirred surf of the ocean. The men were seized with nausea and indescribable feeling of leaving the firmament. The phenomenon lasted less than half a minute, and when it was over earth and sky was as quiet and peaceful as ever. They had expected "a tremor," said to be worse on Ritter Mountain than at any other place known.

THE ROCKLEEE.—An experimenter in Southern agriculture told me the following historical incident of the bees in the South. He took a colony of the little gratuitous honey-makers down in Florida. The first year they reared, threw and stored honey nearly all the wintered summer time. But the second year a few of the more reflective bees evidently turned the thing over in their minds thus: "This country has no winter to provide against; what is the benefit of laying up honey when the flower grows all the year round?" These bees exerted enough influence among their brethren to keep a good many less from laying by the fruit, and to merchandise the second year of their exile.

But the prudential instinct so strong in the little insect prevailed with the majority. They evidently said to themselves, "The winter has been an exceptional year. Next year may bring cold and snow and death of flowers." So there was quite a stock of honey laid by the prudent bees in spite of the strikers. But by the third of the year the conviction had evidently thoroughly penetrated the mind of the bee that it was foolish to lay up in the land of eternal summer. They had then been there the last year day to day, abandoned themselves to living from hand to mouth as recklessly as does any tropic-born butterfly.

SOMETIMES carpets and rugs become badly spotted and it does not seem advisable to take them up. The following method will then be found excellent: Rub a piece of hard soap upon every spot of grease; then take a hard scouring brush and dip it into a large basin of water, in which two tablespoonfuls of water of ammonia has been added, or a piece of carbonate of ammonia has been dissolved. Rub hard until all the stain has disappeared; then rinse it off with clear water; and if the colors seem dimmed, add enough alum to the last water to make it quite sour, and this will restore their brightness.
