Another form extensively used, we read, was called chemical matches, which were sold in little cases at first as high as 15 shill lings a box. They were little sticks of wood dipped first in sulphir and then in a compostillon of chlorate of potash, flowers of sul-phur, colophony, gum or sugar and cinnabar for coloring. Accompaning them in the box was a vial containing sulphuric acid, into which the match being dipped it was ignited by a chemical action induced between the acid and the chlorate of potash. The other ingredients were added merely on account of ir combustible qualitie It is not surprising that, with matches of price, the flint and steel and tinderbox reprice, the finit and steel and tinderbox re-mained in vogue with the great mass of peo-ple. With the flint and steel was used a long match—a splither of wood some seven inches in length, tipped with sulphur. "You strike on the flint," writes an old Englishman "until a shower of sparks fell into one tin-der; some caught; then you put the point of the unich to the spark and blew until the brimstone caught and you were nearly soff. brimstone caught and you were nearly suffo-cated. The tinder-box was generally too dirty for general use, and therefore lamps were burned in bedrooms, and candles, en-cased in large tin cylinders full of round cased in large tin cylinders full of round holes, the whole being stood in a basin with a little water in the bottom." It was about 1825 that the Egyptian came in vogue in England.
