

.... DEATH OF A FORMER EBENSEURGER -Mr David Humphreys, died at his residence in East Conemaugh, on Monday, February 2, 1885, aged about 58 years. We obtained the following particulars concerning him from the Jobostown Tribune : "Mr. Humphreys was born in Ebensburg, December 1, 1826. At the age of 12 years he began driv-ing a team on the old Portage Ranroad on the level between Planes Nos. 7 and 8. In-1856 he was residing at the head of Plane In that year he moved with his famity to East Conemaugh, and entered the en ploy of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company as a fireman. He continued to serve the company in this capacity for a year and a hall, when he was promoted to the position of engineer. His lung experience. ity rail. road matters fitted him for his new trust, and he soon took rank as one of the best men on the line. His usefulness was recognized by the company, and he remained in its service until November 3d last, when failing nealth compelled him to retire. On the 2d of October, 1849, he was united in marriage with Margaret McClain, who survives him By her he had six children, two of whom are dead. The surviving four are Charles R., of East Conemaugh, an en-gineer on the Pittsburg Division of the P. R R ; H. B., an engineer on the Philadelphia Division, P. R. R.; Emms J., wife of A. M. Bersybile, of East Cohemaugh, and Clara, the youngest child, who is at home. The remains were taken to the Summit on Wednesday for interment.
