THE DEATH PENALTY. On Thursday last week Dr. L. U. Beach, of Altoona, was legally strangled in the execution of the death sentence for the murder of his wife in Altoona, on the 7th of April last. On Wednesday evening Beach was taken to the gallows at Altoona, and passed the evening until 12 o'clock in religious exercises, when he retired to bed and slept soundly until about 1 o'clock when he awoke and ate a hearty breakfast. His spiritual adviser, Rev. E. B. Klinger, of Hollistown, Pa., was with him, and he was conversing with him, Beach remarked: "You have been an angel of light to me. Had it not been for your help, I must surely have taken my life long ago. This paper contains enough poison to have poisoned my conscience." Beach then handed Mr. Killinger a paper containing twenty morphine pills that he had successfully secured for his use. Beach then handed them in the form of his shirt. Up until 12 o'clock his time was occupied in religious preparation for his last end, being comforted by his spiritual advisers and receiving a calm demeanor. He drank a cup of coffee and ate a small quantity of food. At 12:30 o'clock he was ready for the execution. He was then marched to the scaffold which he mounted without assistance and with apparent calmness, when Rev. Killinger read the following:
