We meet to ex-change our views as to the best methods of teaching. Our work is of such a nature that we should give it our earnest thoughts and undivided attention. We should have a due appreciation of the nature of techning to make our work successful. Our disconnected efforts we should reduce to a system, and should be willing fearners as to the how this can best be done. It would be "building castles" to imagine our work in a perfect condition; but by comparison of ideas and consulting men of education, we may come nearer the truth than if left to ourselves.— The most successful or important element in teaching is energy. This, with originality and scholarship, caunot fail to make teaching effective. It was the energy of a Faiton and a Morse that gave success to enterprises in their day. Originality is an element of success with the true leacher; it gives variey and interest to all school room work .-Shall we follow the dictates of custom, or follow what the light of reason teaches us? The successful teacher is not always the popular teacher. The teacher who requires purits to master their subjects—in short, to think and work to know the how and the why - may not always be popular, but will, in the end, be successful. Teachers, should we not rather aim to give instruction than get through text books? The pupils in our schools may be pleased with a teacher who allows freedom in study, in recitation, in conduct, but in the end there will be bitter disappointment. The true teacher will nevor be discouraged, but will continue his work with renewed energy, and expect it to be appreciated by honest patrons and school officers.
