—Cambria county had thirty-eight prisoners in the Western Penitentiary during the week ending on Saturday last.

—The Pennsylvania Railroad Company have commenced building parlor cars at Altoona for their own use, their contract with the Pullman Company having terminated.

—The first one was completed last week and is said to have cost \$17,000, is heated by new and improved methods, and is lighted by electricity.

—While coming up from Cresson on the noon train on Saturday last, Conductor Snyder discovered at Kaylor's station that the carriage on one of the wheels of the passenger car was broken, and to avoid an accident he was compelled to leave the car on the siding and bring the passengers up to town on the locomotive.

—Out of 151 applications for license to sell intoxicating liquors in Clearfield county, Judge Krebs has refused 67 and granted 84. The Judge also said: "And we also desire all persons interested to understand that we will not grant licenses in the future to anyone that keeps his eyes open after last past ten o'clock at night."

—The cigar and tobacco dealers of Altoona were notified by Chief Meyer last week, on an order issued by Mayor Mann of that city, that their stores must remain closed on Sunday.

—Threats are made by the dealers, however, and the Sunday law in its application to other business. They claim they are unfairly dealt with.

—A freight train on the Pennsylvania railroad near Carpenter's station, Westmoreland county, parted in the middle and on Monday morning, wrecking twelve cars.

—The wreck was a terrible one, and were in one of the empty cars a woman and her child were instantly killed and another one so badly injured that he will die.

—The courts have decided that "no boundary fence can be made of 'barbed wire' without the consent of parties owning the adjacent land, and that one who puts a barbed wire fence along the highway renders himself liable for all injuries resulting to stock passing along said highway."

—Mr. Samuel Fearl, of Berlin, Somerset county, has bought the furniture, etc., of the late John J. Carter, an old and well known citizen of that place.

—McDonald at Loretto sells 16 pounds yellow sugar for \$1; 12 pounds white sugar, \$1; 8 pounds green or roasted coffee, \$1; 6 pounds green or roasted coffee, \$1; 4 pounds green or roasted coffee, \$1; 2 pounds green or roasted coffee, \$1.

—The Supreme Court has decided that the letting of a house by parol for a certain term of months is not a lease from year to year, but when a tenant from month to month becomes a tenant from year to year, he does not become a tenant from year to year, but remains a tenant from month to month.

—The tenant in such cases is not liable for a white year's rent, and is not entitled to three months notice to quit. Only in case where a written lease provides otherwise is this decision inapplicable.

—A man may lease a house for more than a month or a year when the terms of the written agreement hold good. These facts are important as the first of April approaches.

—Editor Swank of the Johnstown Tribune in February last, published a marriage notice which afterwards proved to be bogus and caused the parties named in the notice to be subjected to considerable annoyance.

—Mr. Swank was determined to find out the parties to the fraud and his efforts have at last been rewarded. The parties, William H. Custer and Ephraim L. Varner, two young men of Jackson township, were arrested on Saturday last and brought before Judge Foster of Johnstown, where Mr. Swank in consideration of the youth allowed them to go, after signing a paper acknowledging that they were the guilty parties and paying the costs.

—It may prove a useful lesson to these young men and to other residents of the town, to furnish untruthful statements for the purpose of inducing or deterring their neighbors.
