It says not a word about the evil effects, but simply the effects of alcoholic drinks, stimulauts and narcot-

ics on the human system. "If the teacher believes that stimulants are not hurtful in the main, he'can so teach and evade the intent of law. If he has con victions on the subject of narcotics, he can so teach and say nothing about smoking and chewing, which many people believe are not our lawmakers have given us. I have not discussed the motives of the law.
