

Water Statement. In pursuance of a resolution adoped by the Borough Council at their last regular meeting, I herewith exhibit a statement of the receipts and expenditures incident to the Water Works for the last five years. It will be observed that the expenditures for 11th Avenue, Near 16th St, the year 1882, exceeds that of any other year given in the statement. The increase for that year was occasioned from the fact that the water in certain parts of the pipes was frozen in the winter of 1881 and 1882, causing a large number of leakages, as well as destroying a quantity of pipes, in addition to the ordinary expense incident to the Water Works. For the year 1884 I have noted an item of \$207 paid for maters, which have been attached to distribution pipes of cerconsumers. These meters so far as they have been used and tested by borough have given entire satisfaction. The decrease of receipts for 1884, is proed from the fact that the water
