Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Reg Be it resolved by the Senale and House of Mep recentatives of the Commonwealth of Pennayl-vania in General Assembly met, that the follow-ing is preposed an amendment of the Consti-tution of the (commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in accordance with it provisions of the eighteenth article thereof.

The office of as as-riate judge, not learned in the law is abslished is counties forming separate districts, but the several associate judges in office when the Con-stitution shall be adepted shall serve for thafr unexpired terms," he and the same is hereby amended, so as for read as follows: Whenever a county shall contain sizy thousand inhabitarts amended, so as it read as follows: Whenever a county shall contain sixty thousand inhabitaries it may constitute a separate judicial districts and may elect one judge learnet in the law, and the General Assembly shall provide for additional judges, as the business of said districts may re-quire. Counties not forming separate districts, shall be formed into convenient single districts, shall be formed into convenient single districts as the General Assembly may provide. The office of associate judge, not tearned in the law, is abolished in counties ferming separate districts and having more than one haw judges avery other county shall elect two associate judges, who shall not be required to be learned in the law; but the several associate judges in office, when this amendment shall be adopted, shall serve for their unexpired term.
