

—We were led into an error last week in stating that Mrs. Sweeney, who died in Indiana on the previous Sunday, was a daughter of the late Barbara Little, of Allegheny township, in this county. She was a daughter of William Weikard, one of the oldest inhabitants of that township, who died several years ago on the farm in the immediate vicinity of Loretto on the Chest Springs road.

—The Rev. Father Edward Burke, pastor of the Williamsburg (Allegheny county) Catholic church, died suddenly of heart disease on last Tuesday evening. He had been complaining for some time past and after supper he sat down in an easy chair, threw his arms back and expired. He was about fifty years of age and founded the church of which he had charge at the time of his death.

—It is a well-known fact that after the 1st of September the reduction of five per cent is made to tax-payers for paying their county taxes before that date stops, and the full amount must be paid after that date. Everything passed off quietly and harmoniously, and the election of the vote for the nomination for Sheriff caused the counting to be watched with eager interest. After the vote had been counted, W. Horace Rose, Esq., of Johnstown, was elected Chairman of the County committee.

—Shortly after 5 o'clock on last Friday morning an alarm of fire was sounded by the whistling and screeching of a dozen locomotives in the yard of Altoona. In a few minutes a terrific fire broke out in the western part of the city. The large planing mill of S. I. Fries was found to be burning, and before the fire department could reach the flames had communicated to the roof of dwelling houses, five of which were burned to the ground. —It appears to be an object in this borough when the water supply gets short to cut it off with as little notice to consumers as possible.
