Bedford county, a young man noted for his mechanical talent and skill, who is working at a wonderful clock, which, when complete, will, that paper believes, eclipse anything ever produced in the clock line, not excepting the famous Strasburg clock. He has been planning and working on this wonderful clock over five years and expects to complete it in about a year. This immense time-piece when done will be twelve feet high by five feet wide and three and one balf feet deep, built entirely of black walnut wood. It is artistically designed, and displays in its composition a grandeur of proportion with its graceful mouldings and delicate carved ornaments. The ends of the case will be ornamented with exquisitely formed columns standing out in full relief, their bases resting on short pedestals, and beautifully carred capitals, supporting an indented frieze and entablature, On the lower front is a circle of eleven dials, with a large dial in the center, giving the time at Washington, D. C., in hours, minutes and seconds, the month of the year, the date of the month, the week, the day of the week, the four seasons of the year and the changes of the moon. The remaining eleven dials give the difference of time in New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Loudon, Paris, Pekin, Constantinople, Melbourne, Vienna, Calro and St. Petersburg. Among the many other curious features more. At a certain hour of the day a figure representing William H. Vanderbilt, the great railroad king, arises from his chair, bolding a charter in his right hand, and in turn all the great' railroad kings of this country slowly enter a door at his left, pass and bow to him and enter a door to his right and disappear. Any person who shall while a candidate for office he guilty of bribery, fraud, or will-ful violation of any election law shall be forever disqualified from holding any office of trust or profit within this Commonwealth; and any person convicted of willful violation of the election on convicted of willful violation of the by law, be deprived of the right of suffrage abso-lately for a term of four years.

SEC. 13. For the purpose of voting no person shall be deemed to have gained a residence by reason of his presence, or lost it by reason of his absence, white employed in the service, either civil or military, of this State, or of the United States, or on the high seas, nor while a sudent of any institution of tearning, nor while kept in a cor house, or other asylum at public expense, nor while confined in public prison.

Sec. 14. District election boards shall consist of a pudge and two inspectors, who shall be chosen annually by the citizens. Election officers shall be priviledged from arrest upon day of election, and while engaged in making up and transmitting returns, except upon a warrent of a court of ecord or judge thereof, for any election fraud, for telony, or for want on breach of the peace. In cities they may claim exemption from jury duty during their term of service.

Sec. 16. No person can be qualified to serve as an election officer who shall hild or wha shall within two months have held an office, or appointment or employment in or under the government of the United States, or of this State, or of any city or county, or any municipal board. or of any city or county or any municipal boars r of any city or county, or any municional board, ommission or trust in any city, save only jus-ices of the peace, and aldermen, notaries public and persons in the military service of the State; nor shall any election officer be eligible in any just office to be held at an election at which he shall serve, save only to such subordinate muni-cipal or local officer, below the grade of city or ounty officer, as shall be designated by law.

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
