St. Francis' College partly burned. About half past eight o'clock this (Thursday) morning a fire broke out in St. Francis' College, Altoona, and one part of the building was burned out, leaving nothing but the walls standing. The buildings were erected at different times, and owing to the nature of the building, the fire spread and the rest of the buildings being of solid brick, and the increasing efforts of the brothers, students and people of Altoona who hurried to their aid, both wings of the College were saved, and the fire confined to the one building. The burned building was about 100 x 20 feet, the first floor was used as an exhibition room and the upper part for sleeping rooms. Nearly all the furniture in the building was saved by hard labor during the burning, but considerably damaged by pipes supplying the College were frozen and burst, and the water from the pipes was carried in buckets, and for a time it looked as if the entire building was doomed. A dispatch was received at this place about nine o'clock asking for assistance and in a short time four horses were hitched to the engine and a number of the Drunken Horses started for Altoona, some going with the engine and others in sleds and sleighs. Before their arrival however the fire had been gotten under control, and a dispatch was received here announcing the fact, but too late to stop the firemen, who had already started. We are informed that the loss is covered by insurance. The building is supposed to have caught fire from a defective flue.
