—Sixteen stone bridges have been erected by the P. R. R. in place of iron ones, during the past two years. This is in accord with the company's policy of ultimately appointing all their iron bridges with stone.
—R. M. Graham, Esq., of Ligonier, while digging on his farm, recently, excavated a couple of old muskets, four tomahawks, minnie balls, human bones, etc., supposed to be relics of the Pontiac war, 1763.

—Owing to a misunderstanding of our contemporary, the Carrolltown News, about publishing the notice in the matter of the application for the passage of an Act of the legislature, authorizing Superintending school directors to erect wire fences, the passage of the Act will hardly be reached at this session.

—Mrs. Daniel Stouffer died at her residence in Greensburg the other night, under painful circumstances. The lady had been ill, and among the remedies prescribed were pills and a few milligrams of morphia. Her little daughter, however, instead of administering the medicines in doses as prescribed by the physician, innocently gave her an enormous proportion of each, soon after which she fell into a comatose condition, and died a few minutes later, without any scientific skill could do her as was stated.

—On Wednesday afternoon, about two o'clock the large frame barn belonging to Mr. Yost Hoehstein, of Upper Valley township, caught fire and was destroyed, together with its contents consisting of several sets of harness, and other spring wagon, one buggy, a threshing machine, two hundred and fifty bushels of wheat and oats, some buckwheat and hay, three calves, a mowing machine, and other farming implements and tools. When out as far as the water works word was brought back that it was the grass in the field, near the house that was on fire. It was then under control and that it was useless to go any further, when the people who lined the road turned back, not sorry that they were disappointed.

—At a shooting match on Monday last, at Gallitzin, between the Gallitzin team and the Carrolltown team for a prize of \$50 and a bear, the Carrolltown team came off victorious. The rules were that the Gallitzin team rest 100 yards with a rest. Mr. C. A. Gray, of Carrolltown, won the bear. He shot standing and without a rest at 60 yards, making a string of 9% inches, ten shots. Jas. Melhorn, of the Gallitzin team, laying down at 100 yards made the best record, 8% inches. The Gallitzin team, at 100 yards made the short string of three inches in eight shots, but the other two were so wild that he was only third in the contest.
