For washing the body panels use a large, soft sponge, well saturated, which squeeze over the panels, so that the dirt will flow of with the water as it runs down Use a second sponge for the under parts and wheels, and carefully dry each part with its special chamels.

4. Don't allow mud to dry on a new or newly varnished carriage; spots and bugs. stains will be the invariable result if you do.

5. Don't use a spoke brush for cleaning the wheels and under parts of veni cles, even when you are tolerably confident that all mud has been removed. It any grit is left on either wheel or bush. it will scratch off the varnish and spoil the gloss as badly as if sandpaper had been used to do the work,

6. Don't allow water to dry of itself on a varnished surface, as this will produce stains. Remove all moisture with the chamois leather only, after the soft sponge has been used,

7. Don't use hot water or soap on a varnished surface.

It covers an area of 60 miles. and within ha limits there is not a settlement. Bear, deer, wild turkey and other game abound, while the cool mountain streams are filled with the speckled beauties that make the heart of the angler leap with joy. The tract of land embraces 50,000 acres, and will be increased by the addition of 20,000 acres, It is fifty miles from the railroad, but is reached by a good macadamized road. None but the most intrepid hunters have traversed its solitary wilds, while only the merry moonshiper has resided within its confines. The bear and deer have had full swing, and the hardy hunters will find great sport in the hunting season in peppering buckshot into this noble game, while there are just enough rattlesnakes loitering on the hills to add the spice of danger to the fun. During the year the preserve will be plentifully stocked with English pheasants, and wild boars will also be turned loose there. A commodious club house will be erected this summer, and experienced gamekeepers will be placed in charge, whose duty it will be not only to protect the property, but the game, by keeping an eye on poschers,

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
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
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

In stocking a stream with trout, the young fish should be taken to its headwaters, or put into the springs and little rivulets which empty into it. As they grow larger, they will gradually settle down stream, and run up again to the head-waters in the fall and winter to

When putting fish into a stream, do not put them suddenly into the water much warmer than that of the vessel in which they have been transported. They will not be so likely to be injured by putting them in water a few degrees colder; but try to avoid all sudden changes, and gradually raise or lower the tempteraure of the water in which and bring them, until it is even with the stream in which they are to be placed.
