Sec. 1. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the qualifications shall be entitled to vote at all elections.

First He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

Second—He shall have resided in the State one Second—He shall have resided in the State one year (or if having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State he shall have removed therefrom and returned within six months) immediately preceding the election.

Fourth—It twenty-one years of age or upward, he shall have pand within two years a State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two mouths and paid at least one month before the election.

Sec. 4 All elections by the citisens shall be by ballot. Every ballot voted shall be numbered in the order in which it shall be received, and the number recorded by the election officers on the list of voters, opposite the name of the elector who presents the ballots. Any elector may write his name upon his tlexet, or cause his name to be written therzon, and situated by a citizen of the district. The election officers shall be sworn or affirmed not to disclose how any elector shall have voted unless required to do so as a witness in a judicial proceeding.

Sec. 5. Electors shall in all cases except treason, telony and breach of surety of the peace, be son, relony and breach of surety of the peace, be or vileged from arrest during their attendance on an election, and in going to and returning therefrom.

Sec. 6. Whenever any of the qualified electors of the Commonwealth shall be in active military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by authority from this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as or shall be prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at their usual place of election.

Sec. 7. All laws regulating the holding of elections shall be uniform throughout the State elections shall be uniform throug out the State but no elector shall be deprived of the privilege of voting by reason of his name not being regisof voting by reason of his name not being regis-tered.

Sec. 8. Any person who shall give or promise to give to any electer any money, roward or other valuable considerations for his vote at any elec-tion, or for withholding the same, or who shall give or promise to give such consideration to any other person or party for such elector's vote or for the withholding thereof, and any elector who shall re-ceive or agree to receive for himself or another, any money reason or other valuable considera-

shall be deemed to have gained a residence by reason of his presence, or lost it by reason of his absence, while employed in the service, either civil or military, of this State, or of the United States, or on the seas, or while a student of any

States, or on the seas, or while a student of a institution of learning, nor while kept in a pohouse or other asylum at public expense, n while confined in public prison.

SEC 14. District election boards shall consol a judge and two inspectors, who shall be chosenually by the citizens.
