

Beautiful Chimes.

Chimes consist of a series of three to five gongs, set either on standards, bands or straps, having previously been tuned and scaled by a tuning fork, xyl-GOOBAITETHE ophque or lathe.

The long neck hand bell, while gracefully yielding to the lucreasing populatily of the gong, is still manufactured, although in not so great quantities as in times past. There is a hand bell made which consists of two gongs with a spring tor gue. It is called the globs hand bell and is fast gaining in

The bell manufacturers are not confined to any particular pattern; they ASPECIFIC FOR MALARIA, are constantly making new designs to meet the demands of new uses.

It is almost impossible to soumera's all the kinds made or to state their nser. Many gong bells are used in toys, the most prominent of which is the new globe rattle. This consists of two small gongs with jinglet attached to a wooden hardle. Then there are the acorn shaped rattlers, spinning ratmakes mant, will be sent on ties, which consist of a gong with an from the afters persons, giring tull axis, around which a string is wound,

Most of these toys are made of tin or composition, the bells being made from the best known metal and finished in the finest silver white.

Special attention is given to the manufactors of call bells, such as are used either upon the desk or table. The gong is used with but little change in chape. There is a great variety of the gign in the base.

Sleigh bells are divided into three classes, round, open and chimes. The round bells are riveted to leather or metallic straps, which hold from elever to ferty-three bells, of sizes varying from three-quarters of an inch three inches in deameter. The open bell is aitached principally to sleigh shafts or poles, and varies from one and one-half to two and one-half inches in diameter. Gung, shaft and pole chimes are coming more into general favor, and are driving the open belt for sleighing purposes out of the market. The sounds produced by their graded tones are far sweeter and toore melodious than the common bell. The sweetest music produced by sleigh bells is the combination of chimes and round bells. They are polished highly, and in many cases are gold or silver plated.

Of the use of the small bell and its adaptations to the needs of man to-day much could be written. On every hand witnessed its employment in the home, office, field and street. It is a great helper to man in ways that are insumerable.

A Marvelous Walking Stick.

A walking stick for tourists and botanists, recently patented in Germany by Herr Herb, Pulsnitz, is furnished with the following articles: One side of the handle is a signal call, and on the other side can be fixed a knife (which is above the ferrule.) In the middle of the handle is a compass. The handle itself can be screwed off, and within is a small microscope with six object glasses. In the stick, under the handle, is a vessel containing other or chloroform. Outside the stick there is inserted on one side a thermometer, and on the other side a sand or minute glass. Above the ferrule is the knife sirendy referred to, and to the ferrule can be screwed a betanist's spatula, or an ice point for glacier parties. Lastly, a meter measure is adapted to the stick. A small hammer and a blowpipe are needed to make it suitable for geologists as well as naturalists.

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

It is made from saw dust, the residum of crude petroleum, and a number of other ingredients which are not made known by the inventors.

The walnut that grows in Persia, Asia Minor, and Circasia, makes the costliest of all cabinet woods, woods. The veneers are cut to one handred and twentieth of an inch in thickness, and sometimes as thin as 175 to an inch. The veneers used on furniture are some what thicker; the thinner ones being used on picture frames and covering for walls, after being backed with strong, tough paper. -

Algarobilla is a tanning material that is used in the Argentine Republic, South America, and gives satisfactory results. English Tanners have experimented with Algarobilla and some of them employ it to-day in their tanneries in England. It is very rich in tannin. The pods of this plant contain forty to sixty per cent, of tannin, and are gathered before becoming quite rips. If this is neglected, the tannin, which is a

yellow powder, would be lost. One of the difficulties of cotton spinsing, says an exchange, is a lack of moisture in the atmosphere; but that has now been overcome in some measure by the invention of a "fog machine," which generates what at first glance appears to be steam, but which is really a spray of water separated into so fine a mist that it has the appearance of one of nature's fogs. The Name of lown. The State derives its name from the tribe now known as the Iowa tribe. Much learning, or at least research, has been wasted in the attempt to show the orthography and definition of this word among the Indians themselves. While Washington Irving, with the license allowable to an imaginative writer, states that the meaning of the word is "beautiful," and recounts the incident by which the phrase was arst applied to the country, saying that the tribe who in their wanderings arrived at the highest point in the lowa prairies, looking over the vast expanse of country uninterupted by hills or swamps, involuntarily ultered the word "lowa," meaning "beautiful," But probably a better authority for the meaning of the word was Mr. Antoine DeClaire, a half-breed of the "Sac" and "Fox" nations, who always asserted humorously that he was the first white man bern in Iowa, though his mother was an Indian. He was employed for many years by the United States as an interpreter in their dealings with the various Indian tribes. His definition of the word was, "Here is the spotthis is the place-to dwell in peace." It is very certain, however, that the name of the State, and the name of one of its secondary rivers, ranning through a large part of the State, is derived from the name of the tribe.

A New Storm Theory.

There is some ingenuity, whether much practical sense or not, in the storm theory put forth by a railroad expert, who takes the 30, 000 locomotive engines in North America as a basis, and calculates that they send forth into the atmosphere 7,000,000,000 cubic yards of steam every day. Adding to these figures the 70,000,600,000 cubic yards of steam discharged by other noncondensing engines, we have a prodigious volume of aqueous vapor which must presently condense and fall back upon the earth in the form of rain. If this calculation is anywhere near correct is it not wonderful that there is as much bumidity in the atmosphere, or that rain is so much more frequent now than of old as to draw invidious comment from persons of advanced years and well-preserved weather memories.
