Pototo Keast.

Here is a good recipe for making potato yeast : Mix together two cups of cooked pointoes mashed through a sieve. one cup of angar and four cups of warm water. Fut this is a warm place for twenty-four hours, when it ought to be foamy. It may take a longer time to sour it, but one experienced in breadmaking can tell when it is ready. It is now ready to be mixed into dough. To provide a petato-ball for the next time, take one oup of musbed potatoes and tablespeon of sogur. Mix this with a little of the form and a little of the sediment (a tublespoon of each will do), cover closely and let stand a few hours in a warm place. Then add a teaspoon of sait, and remove to cool place. When ready to bake again, prepare two cups' of marked pointous, add one cup of sugar, and mix in the potato-ball. Let stand an hour more, take out a cupful for the next baking, add selt to it, and it away. To the remaining three cups field four cops of water, and let it remain over night, when it is ready to main into the sponge.







Making Castor Oil.

The process of manufacturing the oil is very simple. The beans are ground up fine and put in horsebair bags. In this shape they are crushed under a powerful press, giving out in oil about ode-third of their weight. The dry pulp, called "pumice," is sold for fertillzing. The oil is filtered and finally bleached, if for medical use, by exposure to the sun's rays under glass. The amount of castor oil employed for medicine, however, is trifling compared to the quanty consumed in mechanical crafts. For lubricating leather it is unequaled, while its properties as an "alizarine assistant" are incomparable. Alazarine is an element found in coal tar, from which all the brilliant "madder colors are obtained by chemical means. These coal tar tints are used for printing textile tabrics, with an admixture of castor oil to make their

The Japanese beat the world for hand-made paper. The Japanese paper is especially good for etching, and is greatly in vogue among artists. It is exceedingly durable and highly finished. and prints from it are very much finer than any other quality of paper. The hand-made parchment paper is made from the inner bark of the sycamore tree and is of very tough fibre and is beautifully finished. The Japanese government has official documents in its passession printed upon this parchment, which is as good as new to-day, after 1,500 years' wear and tear. The Japs themselves use this paper for houses, coats, umbrellas, screens and every imaginable purpose. The manufacture of hand-made paper is now being principally conducted by the Japanese government as a national enterprise. Some of the finest residences in the

United States and many public builds ings have been lately decorated with Japanese wall paper. This is becoming one of their leading lines for export. The papers are most gorgeous in hue and design, and are very strong and durable. Another attractive feature about them is that they can be peeled right off the wall without any trouble
