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FARMERS OF PENNSYLVANIA.

It is not a sad commentary on the efficiency of the clerical force employed by Mr. Blair that Geo. C. K. Zahn had to be called in to direct the work.

The augmentation of tenant farmers and of mortgages on farm property throughout the whole country clearly demonstrates its dark and critical future.

We must ascertain the cause of this depression. We cannot afford to ignore it. It grows yearly and daily worse.

For so great and marked a declension as the past twenty years has shown in the value of property, there must exist active and powerful causes.

Where shall we look for them, and what shall the remedy be? The most obvious one will induce the conclusion that the trouble is not of natural growth.

This covers the case exactly. As it happens, the chief factors in this depression of farming as a paying business are the existence of farming as an independent, honorable business.

No one can see a profit in a course to us as unfair legislation; no weapon is so deadly as unjust taxation; no means so effective to win the one and wield the other as combination and organization against our right and well being.

Trusts are its ripest fruits and fullest development. The beneficiaries of the trusts are the few who own the trusts.

They have grown audacious to the point of temerity and insolent as imperial dictators. Confident in the support of the millions they have extorted from a long struggle, they no longer disguise their buccannery projects.

Here is the key-note. I think it was Fox who, from his seat in Parliament, declared that the right to tax was the power to destroy.

This was the cord on which the hearts of the Revolutionary patriots struck fire and which they devoted their lives to give the nation's life.

We have allowed ourselves to be engaged on one pretext and another to submit to an increase in taxes, a limitation and what is even worse, an iniquitous distribution of its burdens.

We have permitted the revenue laws of the State to be shaped from time to time, that, as at present, a good one-half of all the property in the Commonwealth is not assessed.

This is the more outrageous, inasmuch as the property thus assessed is much the most profitable that exists in our borders. Its holders are millionaires and corporations.

All other classes of property, except real estate, when taxed at all, pays not to exceed the sixth part of that which is levied upon farm property of equal value.

I will call your attention right here, that there are levied in Pennsylvania, for all purposes, about \$40,000,000 yearly, which is levied on the property, pays \$24,000,000, or less, and the balance, not exceeding \$4,000,000, is all that is demanded of all that vast corporate and personal property.

Roughly estimated, should real estate pay its own share, and no more, it would pay about \$17,000,000 per annum, or just about one-half of what it does pay.

Should corporate and other property pay its just proportion to the ratio, it would pay \$22,000,000 or more than five times what it does now.

How will that affect the State? Allowing the situation to be as here stated, what can we expect?

Equalization of taxation, which is not only just and proper, but which we regard as a vital necessity, an absolute demand, and a great reform movement, it must advance in spite of the organized opposition of many of the most powerful interests and influences.
