We give the receipt for the benefit of those who may be unable to obtain the services of a competent physician, and on the recommendation of one of the best citizens of Butler county: 'Give a good physic of salts; mix a tablespoonful of sulphur in a cup with sugar and water and give immediately after the salts; take good elder vinegar with the quantity of horse radish, snip it and eat the radish, the more the better; also coat the throat with sulphur after eating, and give from one to two tablespoonfuls daily, or enough to keep the bowels moving freely for two or three days. If the throat is sore, use a good quill and blow on the throat; also give a tablespoonful of good whisky three or four times a day.'

The Blacklick Coal Fields. Since the return of A. T. A Maritime Fact. In the Cumberland county jail at Carlisle there are ten convicts, six awaiting trial and one hundred and seventy five truants. The latter class are confined in the cells on the ground, seven in number, and two cells in the upper tier. They are allowed to use the corridors which is common to both tiers of cells. Each cell is fifteen feet long, eight feet wide and ten feet high. There are thus one hundred and seventy-five prisoners confined in nineteen cells. They are composed of men, women and children, males and females without guards or attendants, are promiscuously lodged together. After an inspection of the jail, a few days ago, the State Board of Public Charities exclaims: "We doubt if in the civilized world a more demoralized state of affairs could exist."—Ez.
