Eight Were Killed. ZANESVILLE, Ohio, September 28.—About 1 o'clock this morning a most disastrous freight wreck occurred on the Baltimore and Ohio near Zanesville, Va., a short distance east of this city. Orders were given east and west bound freights to pass at Black Hand, but Operator Kelly at that place failed to give orders to the east bound train. Later he saw his mistake and telegraphed the operator here that there would be a wreck pretty soon and left his post. He is a mere boy, and the engine and a number of cars filled with coal, coke and merchandise were piled up in the greatest confusion.

Eight men were killed, as follows: J. N. McKinstry, William Firestone, William F. Brown, Frankman, Frankman, John Cochran, Ben Strat, George W. Stonebarnes, Zanesville; Tom McKinstry (not found), an unknown. John Kemp, an engineer, had his leg cut off and Freeman Wilson a hand mangled. Those not employed on the train were heading their way from Columbus.

PLATTSBURG, N. Y., September 28.—The regular passenger train on the Champlain railroad was wrecked about thirty miles west of here yesterday evening. In addition to the regular train, there were three coaches heavily laden with excursionists from Morrisville and West Plattsburg. The two cars, containing a large part of the excursionists, were derailed and tipped over on the bank. No lives were lost, so far as can be ascertained, none of the passengers were fatally injured, although many were seriously bruised and badly shaken up.

An Immense Pig Roast. CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—More than one-half of the extensive stock yards plant and property of the Anglo-American Provision Company was destroyed by fire to-day. The most conservative estimate of the loss is \$750,000, the highest nearly \$1,000,000. The property was purchased a few months since by English syndicate. Considerable mystery surrounds the origin of the fire. In the packing house were 6,000 dressed hogs, which had been slaughtered during the past two days, while on the floor of the adjoining warehouse there were 200,000 pounds of sausage in process of curing. On the other floor of this and the adjoining warehouses were stored the product of 100,000 hogs, together with an immense quantity of beef. With this material in the fire, the fire raged furiously for hours, and although 26 of the city engines were called into requisition, it was not until late this afternoon that it was brought under control.

At one time it was feared that the congregation would cover a greater portion of the packing-house district. Several thousand hogs were saved with difficulty from the warehouse. The loss proper is fully covered by insurance, but the loss resulting from the destruction of the hogs will be enormous, as the concern has been selling from 4,000 to 7,000 hogs daily and proposed to increase the number to 12,000 in two weeks. Thirteen hundred men are thrown out of employment. A searching investigation into the origin of the fire is to be made.

Back Pensions for All. WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Representative Owen of Indiana to-day introduced a bill providing that all persons granted to soldiers upon application after July 1, 1865, and which have been granted in consequence of the receipt in the line of duty, shall commence and be paid from the date of the honorable discharge. The Secretary of the Treasury is directed to issue bonds to the amount of \$500,000,000 to pay the arrears of pensions, bearing 2 1/2 per cent. interest, payable in 30 years from date. Every soldier or person who may be entitled to receive arrears of pensions under this law may elect to receive such portion thereof in the bonds provided.

Representative Caldwell of Ohio introduced for reference a bill amending the pension law so as to provide that, in considering claims for pensions where the claimant was a slave at the time of the war, the Secretary of the Treasury shall give preference to those which would have entitled him to a pension, it shall only be necessary to show that such claimant was at the soldier's death without other means of support than his or her own manual labor and the contributions of his or her master.

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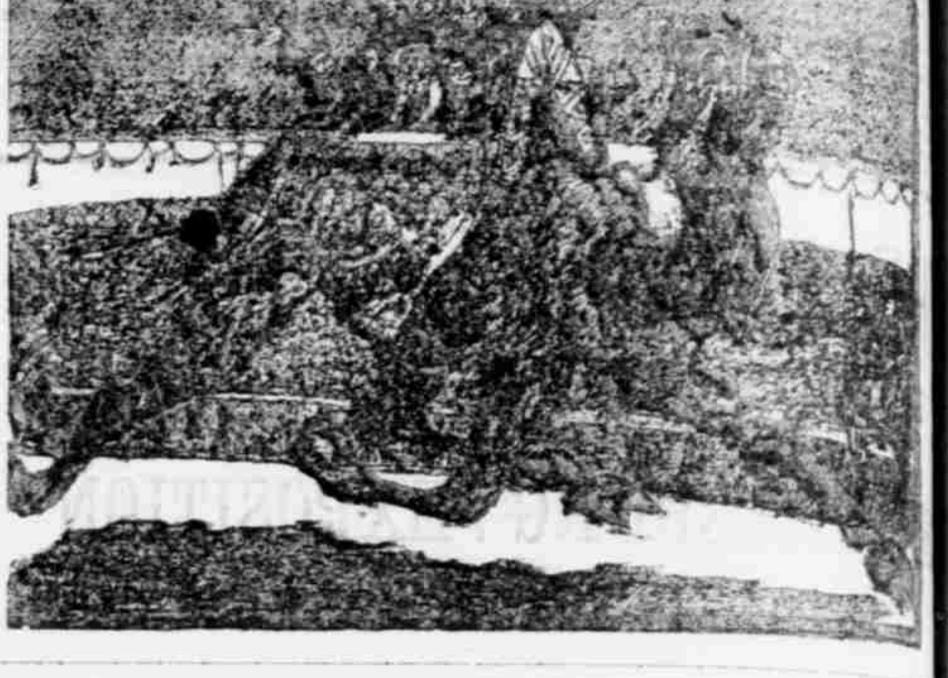
