—Woodman, Spare That Tree. We notice by the Hollidaysburg Standard that the Blair County Agricultural Society is at work planting shade trees on the Dell Delight fair grounds, and the Standard expects in a few years to be able to point with pride, etc. This is in strange contrast with the action of the managers of the Ebsenburg Agricultural Society, who on Saturday last awarded a contract for chopping down what would be, if properly trimmed out, a handsome grove already planted by nature and a source of delight to many who would attend the annual meetings of the fair. It is urged that the trees will obstruct the view of the races to a certain extent and therefore they should come down. Admitting they will obstruct the view for a few seconds, it will but add interest to the scene as spectators upon which horse's nose will be seen first on the other side of the grove, while the deep cut will interfere with the sight to nearly the same extent after the trees are down. We think it a grave mistake on the part of the directors to cut down the grove. There will be hundreds of people, especially women and children, who will care but little for the races, and whose chief delight would be to sit in the cool shade of the trees, discussing the fashions and watching the horse making fools of themselves over the horse races. The deep cut makes that particular spot free from any danger of horses getting off the track at that point, and by some far-seeing device of providence that in the vista of futurity saw in the spot a place of enjoyment for future generations, kindly allowed the trees planted by nature to be spared by the ax until the grounds got into the hands of the Ebsenburg Agricultural Society. If the trees were trimmed up twenty-five feet and left standing during one fair, and then found to be in the way, they could easily be cut down next year, but we feel satisfied that they would prove an ornament and a luxury. To cut them down now seems to us to be a piece of folly that, once done, cannot be remedied.
