H. H. Myers, Esq., visited Pittsburgh the latter part of last week.

—John Michaels, of Jackson township, died at his home in that township Tuesday morning, aged 72 years. The deceased was attacked with cramp on Sunday night and continued to grow worse until Tuesday morning, when death came.

—Berks county farmers are planting potatoes to a greater extent than ever. Many farmers are putting out over one hundred bushels of seed potatoes each, and some are greatly exceeding that number. The average, it is said, will be three times as much as last year.

—Mr. E. B. Crosswell, of this place, went to Pittsburgh on Wednesday for the purpose of interviewing the managers of the long distance telephone company in regard to the erection of the poles in this part of the county. It is expected that the line will be built in a few weeks.

—On Sunday last Robson Lohr, who lives at Grandville, Westmoreland county, met with an accident that almost ended his life. He was opening a jar of peaches, when the jar broke and cut his wrist in a terrible manner. All the arteries and veins were cut, and it was with the greatest difficulty that the life was saved.

—One night last week John Leonard, a prisoner in the county jail, who was suspected by Warden Young of having an inclination to leave, was searched and in his search a small quantity of opium was found in some way succeeded in saving from his iron bedstead, and which he had intended to utilize in attempting to dig through the walls. John was relieved of the bar and will likely be induced to stay.

—On Wednesday morning two Huns were struck by a west-bound locomotive a short distance west of Lilly. One Steve Borsky was killed instantly, while his companion, Mike Seckin, was badly injured and laid for several hours alongside of the track until found by some repair hands. They were both miners and had been working the neighborhood until recently, when they started on a tramp.

—Joshua Evans, mine inspector for this district, is much pleased with the mine law now before the legislature. He says its provisions are the best of any he has ever seen, and he hopes that it will pass without amendment. The fact that this law was recommended by the miners' committee and by the inspectors, and failed to get the endorsements of the operators, is only a proof of its wisdom.

—Jacob Carpenter, a prominent merchant of Bedford county, met with a very remarkable accident on Monday, which resulted in his death. Mr. Carpenter was driving some cattle on his farm, which adjoins his store, with his hat pulled down over his eyes, when he came in contact with a scalding protruding over a wagon-load of lumber. The sharp point of the scalding struck him in the stomach, producing internal injuries, which caused his death.

—On Saturday evening, while Mr. and Mrs. Patrick McDonnell, of Portage, were out visiting a neighbor, leaving four children at home with the doors locked, a lighted lamp was upset and the burning contents fell on one of the children, burning the child so badly that it died on the day morning. The furniture in the room was also badly scorched and had it not been for the prompt arrival of some neighbors, the house with all the children would have been burned.

—The general impression prevails among the farmers that although the frosts of Tuesday and Wednesday morning were unexceptionally severe, the wind which prevailed during the dryness of the atmosphere presented as much damage being done to the fruit crop as was at first supposed. The cherries, peaches, plums and pears are said to be badly injured and in some instances have been destroyed, but the apples, especially the later varieties still give promise of being an abundant crop.

—Here is a fact of more than ordinary interest to whom it may concern: The supervisors of each and every township of this Commonwealth are by law required to maintain at the intersection of all public roads in their district pointers, or line markers, the same to be placed in such places as are convenient, for pointing out the name of the town, village or place to which roads lead, and the distance thereon to each. Neglect to do so subjects the supervisors to a penalty of \$100.

—About one o'clock on Sunday morning a fire was discovered in a stable in the rear of the Rising Sun Hotel, in Altoona. The flames spread rapidly and communicated to an adjacent house, then to the Rising Sun Hotel to the Rheum House adjoining, and across an alley to a frame building belonging to the Altoona Hardware and Supply Company.

—The roof of the store of Wm. Murray & Sons had caught fire and for a time the building was in danger of destruction, but the firemen succeeded in saving it. The losses by the fire are estimated at about \$50,000. All the buildings, including the exception of Wm. Murray & Sons's, were completely gutted and the Arlington Hotel was also severely scorched.

—The loss sustained by C. E. Wolf and Henry Wolf, composing the Altoona Hardware and Supply Company, is estimated at \$15,000, on which there is an insurance of \$18,000 on the Rising Sun Hotel. Patrick McConn, owner, E. M. Woodlen, lessee, will reach Altoona on Monday, May 14, at 10 o'clock, a. m., for the purpose of recovering the insurance on furniture and stock and this sum may vary.

—The owners of the Behm House, loss \$1,000 on building, on which Wm. & Nicholson have \$2,500 insurance. E. T. Drlow, the proprietor of the hotel, estimates his loss on furniture and stock at \$3,000, with an insurance of \$2,500. The house occupied as a restaurant and residence by H. Smith is insured by F. P. Coner, who has an insurance of \$1,000 and his loss will equal that amount. William Murray & Sons's loss may be \$500 and is fully insured. The stock in the store of James H. Daugherty was damaged to the amount of several hundred dollars, and was insured by H. J. Smith in the Jaggard building, is estimated at \$100; insurance \$1,200. The losses sustained at Francis Novelly Store and Graine's shoe store will be several hundred dollars and is insured by H. J. Smith. Shortly after another alarm of fire was sounded and the stable at the White Hall Hotel was found to be on fire. It was soon a mass of flames and burned to the ground, and also a small dwelling house near by. The origin of the fire is a mystery but are generally supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

—Three alarms of fire occurred in Altoona, in quick succession early on Tuesday morning, the occasion of each alarm being a stable or fire evidently the work of incendiaries. The first alarm was at 2 o'clock, when the fire was discovered in the Logan House Companies stables which spread to the livery stable of David M. Green on Ninth street which burned to the ground with a lot of hay, stables, etc. All the horses were taken out. The loss estimated at \$1,000. At 3 o'clock T. C. Parsons stable on Eighth street was found to be on fire and was soon burned to the ground, involving a loss of \$800. About one hour later a stable in the rear of the residence of D. W. Osbaugh, on Seventh avenue was discovered to be on fire and was soon a mass of flames. Two horses were rescued with difficulty. The loss on this stable was about \$600. The fire in Altoona are stirred up by the highest pitch of excitement owing to the frequency of the fire alarms, and the certainty that prevails that fire bugs are at work in the city.
