It was the longest and heaviest train ever carried over any road in this country, and that means in the world. Naturally this train suggests a comparison with the trains of Conestoga wagons which sixty years ago toiled between Eastern Pennsylvania and Pittsburg. The teamster of that period never, in his wildest conceptions, imagined such an advent as the one related above.
