Coing Around the Curve. There has been a great deal said and written about the case with which an electric car rounds a corner as compared with a cable train jerk. The renson almost invariably given is the way the speed of the electric car can be regulated, but this is not entirely the cause. An expert gripman can take his train round a curve with comparatively little jerking, while an export motorman can go him one better and round the bend so smoothly that passengers whose minds are occupied a reading or conversation do not notice the turn at all. The secret consists in keeping the train compact or in having the rear car well up to the motor. This applies equally to steam railroads. ### THE DEMON STEER OF KANSAS

### PARIS ILLUMINATED.

At Present the Best Lighted City in the World. Paris is now on the eve of a revolution in her lighting system. Gas lighting was first introduced in England, but Paris followed in good time, and with a splendor unequaled elsewhere. In like manner, writes Dr. Albert Shaw, in Century, America, Germany and some other countries have been earlier the use of electric lighting; but the Parisians with their superior taste and skill in all matters of municipal arrangements and appointments, are destined to make by far the most brilliant use of the new illuminant. Within one year, or within two years at the farthest, it is confidently claimed that Paris will be incomparably the best lighted city in the world and that electricity will have superseded gas in publie use. In 1878, at the time of the universal exposition, the municipal government ordered the experimental illumination of the avenue de l' Opera and several open spaces with electricity; but the new system was not ripe for large use, and the experiment was soon abandoned. Its principal effect was the stimulus it gave to the gas company, which invented and put into use certain arge compound burners using 1,400 liters per hour, and giving a most brilliant light. The great electrical inprovements of the past decade were exhibited in the French exposition of 1889, and were studied with the utmost care by the Parisian authorities and municipal engineers. Undoubtedly the displays at the exposition had the most pronounced effect in stimulating the new zeal Paris is showing for the appliances of the electric age.

Call for This Steak. Only a few people know that in every carcass of beef there is a choice morsel. Butchers don't tell their customers about it, and very seldom are there any calls for it. We prefer to reserve it for our own tables, says a butcher. This rare cut is known as "skirt steak." 34 is a thin, flat bit of meat, tender and juicy as young grass, adhering to the ribs on either side of the fore part of the steer. The rarity of it is in the fact that out of a whole beef you can get only about two pounds of this steak. It is so thin that it will not fry or broil well in the ordinary way, and the way I have it cooked is to fry briskly in clear, boiling lard. When thus cooked, served piping hot, it is delicious. Of course it comes high.



PARADISE FOR DARKIES.

Where Fruit Grows Out of the Rocks and Frost Is Unknown. One can easily imagine that in a country like this, where fruit and vines row out of rocks, where frost is unnown and one may go barefooted or oathe in the ocean the year round, the colored man finds himself in an earthly heaven, writes a Nassau correspondent of the Chicago Herald. An average negro family in Nassau pays a dollar a month rent for a one-room house, but what does that matter, since they live pretty much outdoors from New Year's to New Year's? A few pennies will buy enough corn hominy for a meal, and sapedillas, mangoes, cocoanuts and pineapples grow in the yard without any

As a rule the negro family does not know at supper where its breakfast is coming from, but they do not worry over a little thing like that. If nothing else turns up they can go down to the harbor and eatch a few fish or send one of the small boys down to the bottom of the water for a conk. The children don't need shoes and clothing, excepting only Sunday outfits, is a very small matter for either adults or chil-

Sunday is the great day. No matter how poor the family, or how few the lay's work had during the week at fifty cents the day, Sabbath morning every colored man, woman and child come out with a spick and span gown and flaring heels, by encasing them in cowhide shoes. The average colored person is proud, even if poor. Those who live in the subuebs and have to come some distance to church walls the two or three or four miles to the outskirts of the town carrying their shoes in their aands, and when they reach the city they sit down and put on their shoes and stockings, hire a carriage at twelve and a half cents per passenger and ride into town in good style, as happy as mortals are permitted to be in this vale

of corns and corruption. Another thing which contributes to the happiness of the colored population on Sunday is the fact that some years ago they made a stand for their rights, and had the doors of all the churches thrown open to them. There is not a church in the Bahama islands without its share of colored communicants. Even at the very high and aristocratic cathedral of the Church of England, about one-third of the congregation is colored, and three or four large black gentlemen, with solemn manners, the queerest neckties ever made, and large. wide boots which pinch their feet, limp up and down the aisles passing the plate. The negro ministers, who are numerous, drop their h's.

Details about the joys, sorrows and incidents of daily life were to be chronicled and each was given permission to point out the faults and failings of the other.

A HUMAN BAROMETER. How a Pennsylvania Man Foretells the Weather.

These marks resemble the discharger of a Leyden jar as much as anything else. There is one mark about two inches long and a quarter of an inch wide, and from this project two other red lines. On the end of each of these is a blue spot. When the indications are for rain these two spots travel under the skin until they touch each other, When the probabilities are for wind or dry weather they separate until they are diametrically opposite. Physicians have examined the discolorations, and say that they are only some kind of pigment under the skin, and that they are similar in nature to birthmarks. 
