Three Idiot Children.

M. H. Sholes, Esq., took testimony today, Monday on the appeal of Clarion county in the matter of liability for the maintenance of the three idiot children of the late George H. Dutton, Col. John P. Linton and Donald E. Dutton, Esq., appeared as counsel for the Directors of the Poor of Cambria county, and Alvin Evans, Esq., appeared as counsel for the County of Clarion county.

The Randolph family came to Johnston in 1888 from Clarion county, and lived in what is now the Fourth Ward. Three of their children, and a grandson, had been taken to the county and taken to the Almshouse. Later they were sent, by order of the Clarion county, to the county of Cambria county, to be supported. That county appealed in 1890 to the Supreme court, which tribunal reversed the order and sent them back to Cambria county.

The Cambria county court was again appealed to and made an order sending the children to Toby township, Clarion county. It is from this order that Clarion county is appealing. The past authorities of this county claim that the Randolphs had not gained a residence here when their children were put upon the county, and therefore, Clarion county, when they came, has a legal right to maintain them.—Johnstown Tribune.

Important for Directors.

On the 16th of April of last year the Governor approved an act which is of much importance to school directors. It makes it necessary for every school director, before entering upon his duties, to be sworn or affirmed to a very solemn oath. The act is as follows:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted, etc., That all persons elected to the office of school director, after the passage of this act, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, shall before entering upon the duties of such office, take and subscribe to an oath or affirmation, to be administered by the County or City Clerk, or the County or City Auditor, or the County or City Treasurer, or the County or City Assessor, or
