.... **Death of Colonel John P. Linton.** Colonel John P. Linton, of Jonnstown

died at his home in the 5th ward, Johnstown, on Wednesday morning at twenty minutes after four o'clock, aged 59 years, months and 5 days. In the death of Colonel Linton Cambria county loses one of her most honored citiens and the bar one of the brightest members of the legal profession. Colonel Linton was born in Johnstown and was a sonof the late ex-Sheriff Robert P. Linton, who was well known to the older neople of the county, having served as sheriff of the ounty at different times three terms. At the age of eighteen Colonel Linton entered the law office of Cyrus L. Pershing, Esq.,

now president indge of the courts of Schuylkill county, then practicing law in Johnstown, where he remained a student intil he was admitted to the bar on the 6th of June, 1854. He practiced his profession

until the breaking out of the civil war when he entered the army as captain o ompany F. Third regument, three month ervice. After being mustered out at the and of the term of enlistment, the Colonel assisted in raising the 54th regiment and entered the service as major. He was with is regiment until the end of its term of service, Fohrmary 3, 1865, participating in many engagements, being three times se verely wounded, and when mustered on was lieutenant colonel of the regiment.

In 1866 he was the Democratic nomine for Surveyor General but was defeated by General Jacob M. Campbell: In 1867 he was elected a member of the legislature from this county. In 1808 he was the Dem-

ocratic candidate for congress in this district, his competitor, who was elected, being the late Hon, Daniel J. Morrell, of of Johnstown. In 1891 he was nominated by the Democrats as their candidate for president judge in this county, but owing to dissensions in the Democratic ranks, was defeated by Hon. A. V. Barker.

Colonel Linton was married in 1856 to a daughter of George S. King, and his wife, four sons and three daughters survive him. His funeral will take place at Johnstown on Saturday at 2 o'clock, p. M. :

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
