Foot Ground On

The threshers connected with the threshing machine owned and operated by Michael Reigh were employed at the farm of Lemuel A. May, near Sabbath Rest, Blair County, Pa., on Saturday last.

It is reported that Mrs. Sarah Resler, whose home is near Baker's Furnace, her daughters Sarah and Ida, aged nineteen and eight years, respectively, and her son, Daniel, together with a number of other people, were waiting on the platform at the Conemaugh Furnace station for the Harrisburg Accommodation, all being bound for Johnstown.

As the train arrived they all made a rush for it. The Western Express, an hour and a half late, dashed by the track, striking Sarah Resler and her little sister, and mangled them horribly.

One of Sarah's legs was torn off and she was otherwise terribly cut and bruised and Ida's skull was crushed and the brains were exposed.

The express train overcame its terrible speed and stopped within a distance of perhaps twice its own length and backed up to the scene of the double tragedy, and after the conductor had taken note of the occurrence, it proceeded on its way. The bodies were prepared for burial and removed to the stricken home.

Plan to Instruct Voters

The Chairman of the Democratic State Committee recommends that in order to instruct the voters under the new ballot law, that in each election district the county committee organize a Democratic club; that they select two officers and direct the secretaries to notify every Democrat in the district of his election as a member of the club; that all clubs procure a small blackboard, with a fac simile of the ballot printed or written upon it; that elections be held, and that persons desiring to vote, should place their cross mark in ink upon the ballot on the blackboard.

An instructor should be present and ascertain the intention of the voter. Then in the presence of the club, conduct any and every voting matter that may be desired.

By this method the voters in a number of districts have already been thoroughly instructed in the use of the ballot. It is a cheap and effective method, and should be adopted in all districts.

Election Watchers

Under the new Pennsylvania Ballot law, which goes into effect in this county on the first time on Tuesday, November 4, 1902, each party having candidates on the ticket to be voted for, has the privilege under that law of appointing three electors of their separate party as watchers.

Below we give extracts from the law relating to this important matter:

1. Each party or group of citizens that has made official nominations may have three electors as watchers at each voting place, but only one watcher in the room at one time, and he must remain outside the enclosed space. Section 24.

2. Every watcher must have a certificate from the commissioners, or township or borough authority, which he must show on request. Section 24.

3. Watchers may keep poll books and challenge lists, but can make no memorandum of the number of any ballots. Section 24.

4. One watcher for each party or group may remain in the voting room after the polls are closed until the votes have been counted and the result announced. Section 29.
