Sx-State Senator Hannibal K. Sloan, Democratic candidate for congressmanat-large, died at his home in Indiana, o Saturday forenoon at 11 o'clock. The cause of his death was pneumonia. Hannibal K. Sioau was born September 4, 1838 at Indiana. 
