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MURDER IN THE SECOND DEGREE.

JAMES McILVOY CONVICTED ON TUESDAY EVENING.

The McIlvoy murder case from Tunnel-hill borough was taken up in court on Tuesday morning and occupied the attention of the court all day.

The jury was impaneled with little difficulty. Out of twenty-five men called, the following were selected: Paul Pringle, Frank Gopple, John S. Davis, Tobias Moody, Samuel Arthurs, Harry L. Horn, O. C. Hanson, Fritz Miller, George C. Diehl, John Fritz, John Rippey and Matthew Copelin.

Patrick Boylen was the first witness called and testified as follows: "I was home during the afternoon of Saturday, August 18, 1891. Between the hours of 3 and 4 o'clock I heard two shots fired, followed by a few seconds by a third. After a short period of quiet I heard a fourth shot. I went out on the street and met James McIlvoy, who told me they had a fuss at his brother's home. I went over to his brother's and found McIlvoy on the landing of the stairs. Blood was oozing from a bullet wound in her neck. She breathed her last while I was there."

Other witnesses told substantially the same story. The defense claimed that James McIlvoy was drunk that day and had gone to bed. When he awoke he drew his revolver and fired into the ceiling. His wife asked Joe, his brother, to take the revolver from him, and in the scuffle that ensued, it was discharged and the bullet found lodged in the woman's neck. Several witnesses supported this claim.

The jury, after being about two hours, found a verdict acquitting Joseph McIlvoy and finding James McIlvoy guilty of murder in the second degree.

The latter was much dejected at the result of the trial, and while on his way back to the jail, remarked to the officer that his conviction was "a d-d shame."

Died in Church.

At the close of the prayer service a congregational meeting was held to act on the resignation of the pastor, Rev. J. G. Groer. Shaffer strenuously opposed an action on the resignation and finding that such a resolution had been carried on viva voce vote demanding a rising vote but instead of rising to his feet he rolled out on the floor and after a short struggle expired.
