NOVEL DEFENSE TO BE MADE.

It Is Questionable Whether the Court Will Admit Testimony of a Hypnotic Character - Hayward's Father Says His Son Is Not Guilty.

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 19,-W. W. Hayward, Harry's father, declares that both of his sons will be cleared, that Blixt is confessedly a notorious liar and that his various confessions will have no weight. He added that the defense had evidence that Blixt was in the power of a gang and committed the crime under their dictation with the understanding that if discovered it should be ascribed to Harry Hayward. This gang, he added, was not composed of Minneapo his people. Mr. Hayward refused to account for the behavior of Adrain, the older brother, saying it would be explained later.

Mrs. Claus A. Blixt has made a long and succinct statement to R. R. O'Dell, her husband's attorney, the purport of which was that she had long known of the immense influence exerted over her husband by Harry Hayward. She tried in vain to counteract it. Blixt said several times that Hayward would be the death of him and that he dared not disobev him.

Just before the crime Blixt went around like a man in a dream; it was hard to attract his attention, and his memory became defective. Hayward impressed on Blixt what he had to do many times a day, and kept the idea of the crime constantly before him, ac-

cording to the wife's statement. This evidence is to be used in con-nection with that of Blixt's father and brother to show that the man was of a temperament most susceptible to an influence that approached the hypnotic in its character. It is a question as to whether the court will permit testimony of a hypnotic character, but the defense will make a strong effort to show at least that Blixt was not a free moral agent when he committed the crime. This line of defense will make the trial a most novel one in criminal annals.

TAX COLLECTOR SCARED. He Flies Before 1,000 Irate Kentucky

Taxpayers. MORGANFIELD, Ky., Dec. 19.—Tax Collector Blackwell and his son have left town. As it had been said that Blackwell would hold a special sale, people from all over the tax district began to pour into town early. When a special train bearing 1,000 of the irate taxpayers arrived, Blackwell evidently became alarmed and he and John Feland, at-torney for the bondholders, hurried to the depot and boarded the train for Uniontown, much to the disappointment of the people. The sale therefore did not come off.

Blackwell has advertised a sale of personal property and land to recover taxes due the railroad for Jan. 7, and it is supposed that there will be trouble if he attempts to hold the sale.

A \$30,000,000 Mortinge Declared Void MILWAUKEE, Dec. 19.—In the Chicago and Northern Pacific case in the United States court, William Nelson Cromwell, appearing for the defendant, set up the somewhat sensational claim that the Chicago and Northern Pacific mortgage, covering an issue of nearly \$30, 000,000, is absolutely void. This pleasant surprise to the bondholders is based upon the claim that the Farmers' Loan and Trust company has invalidated itclaim by failing to comply with the law: of the state of Illinois.

Chinese Officers to Be Punished.

Shanghai, Dec. 19.—An imperial decree has been issued ordering Li Hung Chang to arrest Kung, the Taotai of Port Arthur, and the four Chinese gen erals, who were in command at Port Arthur and to send them to Pekin for trial and punishment for the loss of that important dockyard and fortress. Admiral Ting has been arrested for failing to defend the dockyard of Port Arthur against the Japanese forces.

May Be Finished Today. WEST POINT, N. Y., Dec. 19.-The new model which is to surmount the Battle monument at the United States

There is now no doubt that the whole miserable affair resulted from Huntington getting his accounts mixed and that he was not a thief, but thought he was to be so branded.

His Wife Killed Him BARBOURVILLE DEPOT, Ky., Dec. 19 .-John Cox attempted to kill his wife at Grays, in this county. Cox was drunk and fired two shots at his wife but missed her. Seizing an ax he threw it at her head but missed her. The woman picked up the ax and attacked her husband, almost chopping his head from his body. The woman has not yet been arrested.



An Increase Shown In Some Departments,

HARRISBURG, Dec. 19,-The corporations of | ennsylvania paid into the state treasury during the year ended Nov. 18 last \$3,600,000 tax assessed. against them by Auditor General Gregg on their capital steck, an increase of \$80,000 over last year. The gross receipts tax in 1893 amounted to \$542,000, or \$233,000 less than this year. The recounts from tax on bank stock decreased from \$530,000 to \$511,000, and the tax in corporation loans increased from \$769,000 to \$1,244,000, while the revenues from the tax on minuteipal loans dropped from \$251,000 to \$150,000. There was a decrease in the receipts

from the tax on personal property from \$3,502,000 to \$2,386,000. There was realized this year from the various kind of licenses \$1.356,000, an increase of about \$3,000 over 1866. The receipts from mercantile tax fell off from \$582. 000 last year to \$54 ,000 this year. On the other hand the revenues from wholeale liquor licenses increased about \$35.

The tax on collateral unheritance decreased from \$1,134,000 m. 1893 to \$869. 000 this year. The average the past eight years has not varied much from \$1,000,000. This year the bonus on charters was \$194,000, which is \$20,000 less than the previous year. The fees paid by public officers were increased from \$143,000 to \$157,000, and the refunded cash increased from \$18,000 to \$83,000. The receipts from the tax on gross premiums collected by the auditor general were increased from \$463,000 to \$495,000. The receipts from the tax on grass premiums collected by foreign in 1000 to \$354,000.

The expenses of the government, which includes the various state departments and the legislature, were about 130,000 less this year than in 1859. The otal expenses in 1894 amounted to \$2,038,000 in round numbers. As the egislature did not meet this year the state saved about \$100,000 on this acount. This gain, however was nearly nade up by the \$625,000 expended on he new executive and library building and the resprovements and alterations o the ball of the lieuse of representaives and the senate chamber.

There was distributed among the shool districts of the state last year \$5,769,147,27, an excess of \$994,000 as compared with the amount paid the pre-vious year. There was returned in 1893 to the countries \$1,018,000 of the revenues collected from the tax on personal property. This year the amount only reached \$1,050,000. This large discrep-ancy is accountable for by the fact that the state owes the counties about \$1,-00,000. The cost of the national mard this year was \$112,000, as against \$106,000 in 1883. There was expended \$1.465,000 in 1883 in redecining and purchasing loans and paying interest. There was applied \$105,000 the previous


