

AGREEMENT TO SIGN...

Carlisle Before the Ways and Means Committee

PARTISAN DIFFERENCES DROPPED

A Sub-Committee of Democrats and Republicans Appointed to Arrange a Financial Plan - Carlisle Reveals Some Bond Issue Secrets.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.-The house committee on ways and means has consumed one more of the ten days within which the treasury has an option to make the new bonds payable in gold.

The resolution reported at the last meeting is to authorize the secretary of the treasury to issue \$50,000,000 in 3-per cent bonds, payable in gold, with the proviso that none of the proceeds shall be used for current expenses.

Mr. Bryan (Dem., Neb.) offered a resolution that the secretary of the treasury should pay all obligations of the government in either gold or silver, whichever it was the most convenient.

Secretary Carlisle came before the committee and presented a typewritten copy of the contract which had been called for. It was drawn in legal form and covered two typewritten pages.

When Mr. Reed asked why the plan which he had proposed should be adopted, the secretary replied that it was the only one which had been presented.

There was a disposition on the part of certain members to intimate in their questions that the administration had shown favoritism in its selection of a private contract, and the question was directly asked whether the bonds were to be sold to the government.

The secretary proceeded to quote a feature of the act which authorized the issue of the bonds, and he was obliged to accept the best terms that could be made with them.

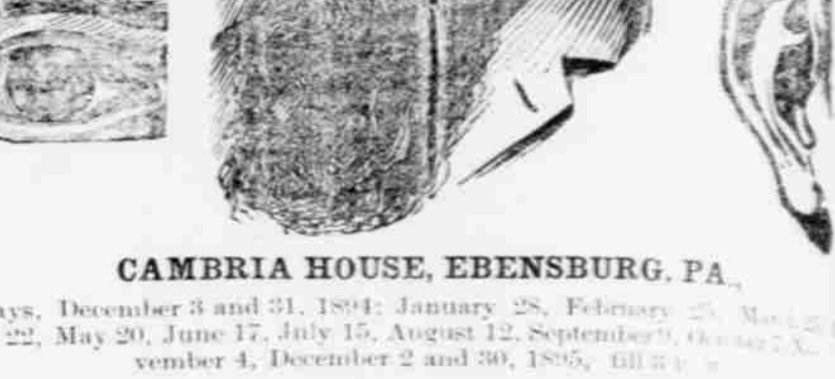
