AGREEMENT IN SIGHT.

PARTISAN DIFFERENCES DROPPED

A Sub-Committee of Democrats and Republicans appointed to Arrange a Financial Plan - Carliste Reveals some distance, and went on the switch at Bond Issue Secrets.

WASHINGTON, Feb 13,-The house committee on ways and means has consumed, one more of the ten days within which the treasury has an option to make the new bonds payable in gold, and made decided progress toward an agreement apon a plan to be reported. to the house After being closeted for two hours with Secretary Carlisle, the committee talked over the situation. delegated the framing of an agreement to a sub-committe of three Democrats and two Republicans, and late learned that its sub-committee had dropped partisan differences, and found common ground

The resolution reported at the last meeting was one to anthorize the secre tary of the treasury to issue \$62,000,000 in 3-per cent bonds, payable in gold. with the proviso that none of the proceeds shall be used for current expenses. and the further provision, requested by Secretary Carlisle, repealing the law which requires the government to redeem national bank notes, and requir ing banks to redeem their notes in the first instance. Inquiry was made it there was a minority report, and Mr Rece: said there was none, although he telieved a wiser plan would be to provide for increasing the revenues

Mr. Bynum (Dem., Ind.) proposed his resolution as a substitute.

Mr. Wheeler (Dem. Ala.) offered a resolution reciting that Secretary Carlisle had admitted that the issue of gold bonds would compel all future issues to be made payable in gold, that bime tallism had been declared to be the policy of the government, that this would be an abandonment of bimetallism, and therefore declaring that the committee considered it inexpedient to adopt the president's recommendations

Mr. Bryan (Dem., Neb.) offered a resolution recommending that the sec retary of the treasury should pay all obligations of the government in either gold or silver, whichever it was the most convenient to use

Secretary Carlisle came before the committee and presented a typewritten copy of the contract which had been called for. It was drawn in legal form, covered two typewritten pages, and bore the signatures of John G Carlisle, secretary of the treasury; J Pierpont Morgan, for J. S. Mergan of London, August Belmont, for N. W. Rothschild. and was witnessed by Francis Lynde Stetson of New York, formerly Presi dent Cleveland's law partner.

The principal features of the contract were made known in the president's message. Upon one point, the secretary particularly enjoined the committee to maintain secrecy, and that was regarding the dates for making the pay ments for the bonds. He asked for se

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
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bonds, and because they feared that the bankers would corner the world's gold against them if the time it would needed was known, and the methods by which it was to be obtained Accord ingly the committee adopted a resolution pledging its members not to reveal the terms of the document, so far as it concerned the payments. Many questions were asked the secretary, which he answered in order, giving the amounts of all kinds of money in the treasury and much other information not new. When Mr. Reed asked why the plan which he recently proposed in the house as a substitute for the adminis

tration bill, was a satisfactory measure. the secretary proceeded to quote a feat ure of the act of 1874, which had not seen before noticed in the financial de bates, and which seemed to greatly in validate Mr. Reed's scheme This clause binds the treasury to the redemp tion of national bank notes by treasury notes when the holders formally request it Consequently the withdrawals of the greenbacks much the treasury, the secretary argued would not stop the drain of gold apon it, but would merely add another step to the process of ob taining gold, as financiers could procure the national bank notes and secure treasury notes for them. In effect, therefore, the government is bound to reduce bank notes in gold To obviate this difficulty, the secretary suggested that the committee adopt a plan to com pel the national banks to maintain an agency for the redemption of their notes and relieve the treasury of all burden in

the premises There was a disposition on the part of certain members to intimate in their mestions that the administration had shown favoritism in its negotiation of a private contract, and the question was rectly asked whether the bonds were not to be sold at a rate unnecessarily low considering the prevalent prices in the market Secretary Carlisle admitted that the bankers practically had the government at their mercy, and he was soliged to accept the best terms that could be made with them That better terms could have been secured he denied emphatically, relating somewhat in detail the different financiers with whom Assistant Secretary Curtis had miked with on his visit to New York and those who had visited Washington

In answer to other questions, he as sured the committee of his belief that a plan could be devised to stop the out low of gold, and of his strong hope that the forthcoming bond issue would main tain the gold reserve at its high-water mark for several months

After the secretary had departed, Mr Crockran (Dem , N Y.) announced that he could not support Chairman Wilson's resolution, because it was simply a make shift to meet a present emer gency, and offered no help to the treas ry in the event of similar exigencies before the next session of congress Thereupon Mr Tarsney (Dem. 
