An equity suit against the Altoona, Clearfield and Northern railroad company, to compel a foreclosure sale on a mortgage for \$60,000 in favor of the Pennsylvania Trust company of Reading, was begun in court at Hollidaysburg Thursday.

A petition was presented in the Blair county court for the removal of the county commissioners James Funk and John Hurd from office, on the grounds of neglect and extravagant management of the county affairs, favoritism in the award of bridge contracts.

By the parting of a freight train at Mayes Summit, on the Pennsylvania & Northwestern railroad on Tuesday morning, Brakeman W. H. Weisenring was killed. He was stepping from one car to another as they parted, and he fell being run over. His legs were crushed and a severe cut inflicted on his head.

Farmers are warned against wheat swindlers who are said to be working in the eastern part of the state, and are liable for any amount you at any time. They are canvassing with a fine grade of wheat, which they allege will yield an average of 50 bushels to the acre.

Daniel Pringle, aged about fifty years, whose home was in Altoona, was struck by an empty freight engine on the Pennsylvania railroad, near G. Z. signal tower, in Altoona, at 4 o'clock on Wednesday morning, and he died a short time after, at the Logan House, from the effect of his injuries.

An unknown man was struck and killed by third section of Day Express, a short distance beyond Kittanning point, between 12 and 1 o'clock on Monday afternoon. He was from all appearances a tramp, about 25 years of age, and looks to be either a German or a Swede.

Mr. Jacob Hoover, Sr., died at the home of his son, Jacob A. Hoover, in Carrolltown, on Saturday. He was 80 years of age and was born in Bavaria and at the time of his death was 53 years, 5 months and 4 days old.

Judge White Wins. Indiana, May 4.—At 10 o'clock this morning the court in the Blair-White judgment met in open session, and delivered an opinion in favor of the latter.

The contest was instituted by Mr. Blair, candidate of the Democratic and Independent Republicans, who alleged that enough illegal votes had been cast for Judge White to more than offset his majority on the face of the returns.

Judge White was present when the declaration of the court was read, and he did not hear the news until after court had adjourned. As the judges were ascending the steps, a spectator started to applaud. Judges Doty and Ebyurn were around and shot fierce glances over the house, and the attempt was not repeated.

Judge Doty said that he and his associates were well aware of the intense interest in the case all over the county, but that the result would be received without any manifestation of feeling. He added that any attempt at applause would be interpreted as contempt, and would be punished accordingly.

After the announcement of the result, an order of court was read, in which the sheriff was directed to burn the ballots in the presence of the county commissioners. This was objected to by Mr. Ruffner, and the order was modified to read "that the ballots be burned within 30 days, unless an appeal has been taken out before that time."

Accused of Blackmail. Pittsburgh, May 6.—The widow of a man who gained a national fame in the flood at Johnstown, in 1889, is accused of blackmail in an answer to her suit filed Tuesday in Common Pleas court.

She is Mrs. Anna Malz, whose husband was the Paul Revere of that terrible disaster. Her husband, through the valley of the Conemaugh, warning the people of the coming of the torrent of water, and lost his life through his bravery.

In her suit Mrs. Malz claimed she had loaned John Noy, who was a friend of her husband, at various times, about \$4,219, and he refused to pay any of the sums back. Noy in his answer relates an entirely different story.

He says he received \$100 from Mrs. Malz, which he returned. He says Mrs. Malz owes him \$1,000, and because he would not give her any more money, she has threatened a pretended expense, which he says is an attempt at blackmail.
