Amended Ordinance.

Amending an ordinace to prevent cattle from running at large within the limits of the borough of Elensburg, Pa., approved January 28th, 1894. Be it ordained and enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the borough of Ebensburg that the Ordinance passed and approved the 29th day of January, 1894, be and the same is hereby amended as follows, to wit:



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
