Amended Ordinance.

Amending an ordinace to prevent cattle from running at large within the limits of the borough of Ebensburg. Pa., approved January 29th, 1894. Be it ordained and enacted by the Burgess and Town Council of the borough of Ebensburg that the Ordinance passed and approved the 29th day of January, 1894, be and the same is hereby amended as follows, to wit;

That no person or persons shall suffer or permit his, her or their cows or cattle to run at large within the limits of the borough, between the hours of eight o'clock, r. M., and six o'clock, A. M., from the first day of Juge, 1895, to the first day of November, 1895, and in each and every year thereafter, commencing with the year 1896, from the first day of May to the first day of November, and for each and every offence in violation o' this Ordinance the person or persons so Amending an ordinace to prevent cattle from

vember, and for each and every offence in violation of this Ordinance the person or persons so offending shall fortest and pay for each of said animals so found running at large a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than fire dollars; and all such animals found running at large shall be considered as a public and a common nuisance, and it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner or any policeman of the borough to seize and take into custody and impound every such animal found running at large, as afore said, and if, after four days' public notice, no person shall appear and claim the animals so impounded and pay the fine and all costs and charges attending the seizure and keeping of same, every such animal shall be sold at public sale by the Street Commissioner or policeman, and, after retaining the amount of the reasonable costs and and expenses, he shall pay the balance, if any, to the Tressurer for the use of the borough. 
