The remaining 19 plants west of Pittsburg have sold their glass and as a result the end of the season found aso,000 boxes of glass in warehouses. The 12 companies that have been working on the quiet had 360,000 of these, and half of the remaining 20,000 boxes will not be fit to move for breakge and assortment. The 10,000 boxes will be exhausted in a couple of views and then the combine will have the market

in their own bands. big trade of their own. They only have 00,000 boxes available and they are held by the McKee, the Avermore, the reanette and one of the plants in Pittsburg. They will not ship east and will raise their prices to correspond with the gas belt manufacturors. A raise of 25 per cent on all windowgtass has been made, and after 10,000 boxes are disposed of the price will go still higher. According to the workers union the plants cannot open before Sept. 1, and the fact that the workers will demand the restoration of the 22 \(^1_2\) per cent cut of last year will make the other manufactorers make this concession if they

Something Causing Mysterious Deaths at Blossburg, Pa.

VICTIMS SWELL UP AND DIE.

The Mysterious Malady Appears to Result From Poison Caused by a Bite-Excited People Think It Either a Plague or Poismous Insect.

Wellsboro, Pa., July 10. The physicians attached to the state hospital at Blossburg, this county, are trying to solve the mystery surrounding peculiar cases of apparent poisoning that have been brought to their attention. A few days ago Jacob Rymska of Blossburg died presumably from the effects of a bite from some insect, as he stated that he felt a sting under his eye soon after going to bed. He died two days afterward. Since that time there have been three similar cases in that town, one of them proving fatal. In the case of Rymska the patient's head swelled to enormous proportions and his death was caused by suffocation occasioned

by the terrible swelling. Last week Henry Dyke of Richmond was taken to the state hospital suffering from the effects of a poisonous bite on the top of his bald head. His eyes were swollen shut, his head was greatly swollen and it was considered a daugerous case, although he now seems to be improving.

Joseph Wituski, a workman in the Blossburg tannery, thought he had been bitten on the cheek by a mosquito recently, but the small pimple continued to swell until the man's head was a sight to behold. He suffered terrible pain, but recovered. The 3-year-old child of Jacob Losiniocki, also of Blossburg, has died re

cently from the same disease.

child's left eye. Two days later the little one's head had swollen to remarkable proportions and death followed in great agony. In the fatal cases the bodies turned to a dark color almost immediately after death. It is reported that a number of cattle have died in that region lately with the same mysterious symptoms. The physycians are unable to explain the matter. The people of the neighborhood are excited, some claiming that a poisonous fly has been imported,

while others maintain that it is a plague
