

In 1784, says McClure's Magazine, Old Putell, the son of an old clothes dealer, and the ex-parimer of Foote the comedian in a brewers, took £200,000 from the bank by forgeries, making his own tills, paper and press, and he himse himself when arrested. Astlett, in 1806, embezzled exchequer bills to the value of gargoon, Fauntherov, a banker, in 1914, obtained £360,000 by forging powers of attorney for sale of consuls, and was hing at Newgate. In the general jubilee throughout the city over the proclamation of peace with the American republic, in 1785, fourteen formed 250 notes were easied unnoticed, and for years in the early party of this century, the bank's annual loss by counterfeits was a figure of many thousands of pounds. Forgeries today are rare. The machinery of detection is perfect, and the system of numbering as well as the perpetual use by all banks of freshly printed Bank of England notes, presents insurmountable obstacles to "smashers."

HINTS FOR HOUSEKEEPERS.

EFFACE scratches on furniture by rubbing on some linseed oil and then following with a little shellac dissolved

Nothing will give such a polish to glass, even in the finest, as slightly moist newspaper to wash it and dry newspaper to give the finishing touches. It will be well when cane-scated chair bottoms have "sagged" to make them as tight as ever, by washing them with hot soapsuds and leaving them to dry in the open air.

To CLEANSE glass bottles that have held oil, place ashes in each bottle and immerse in cold water, then heat the water gradually until it boils; after boiling an hour let them remain till cold. Then wash the bottles in soapsuds and rinse in cold water.

Steel knives or other articles which have become rusty should be rubbed with a little sweet oil, then left for a day or two in a dry place, and then rubbed with finely-powdered, unslaked lime until every vestige of the rust has di appeared, and kept in a dry place.
