

Martin Ballweaver, one of the first settlers in Cambria township, and who has been in Minnesota for the past forty-two years, came to St. Lawrence last Sunday, having made the entire distance—1,400 miles—on foot. Although Mr. Ballweaver is 70 years of age he is none the worse for his long tramp.—Hastings Tribune.

On Sunday Alex Buck, accompanied by Miss Mary and Susie Little, all of Loretto, were riding on the train at East Liberty and about to reach at night started to return home. Shortly after starting the horse became unmanageable and went down high street on a run. One of the ladies jumped out while the other and Mr. Buck remained in the vehicle until it collided with an electric light pole opposite the residence of County Treasurer Barker and they were thrown out. All fortunately escaped without injury but the buggy was badly wrecked.

A dispatch from New Castle, Pa., says a man named C. C. Zehn, who was engaged in this section in the shape of small green insects, which collect in great numbers on the underside of the leaves, sucking the sap from the plants and causing them to wither. The blight extends downward rapidly. C. C. Zehn, who is in the tubers by small white specks, causing them to have a leoprot appearance. Decay soon follows the work. The blight has caused a great deal of alarm, as farmers and gardeners, who, owing to the failure of other crops, are depending upon their potatoes as a chief source of money-making this fall.

James B. Zahn Killed. On Saturday morning about eleven o'clock a telegram was received here announcing that James B. Zahn, of Pittsburg, died suddenly in that city. Later information conveyed the intelligence that Mr. Zahn, who resided in the East End of that city, and who was employed as chief book-keeper at the offices of the Carnegie Steel Company on Fifth avenue, had been killed on the Pennsylvania railroad while on his way from his residence to the office. He left home as usual in the morning and boarded a train at East Liberty. The train being crowded, Mr. Zahn was standing on the platform of the third car, and when the train was rounding the sharp curve at Ben Venue station, he was jolted off. He tried to catch the hand rail but missed it, and alighting his head, his skull was crushed, causing death almost instantly. His remains were sent to the morgue, where his identity was established, and then removed to an undertaker to be prepared for burial. On Tuesday afternoon he was buried in the cemetery at East Liberty. He was the son of Geo. C. Zahn, Esq., and on Tuesday at 1 o'clock, p. m., were interred in Lloyd's cemetery.

The deceased was born in Ebersburg on the 24th of March, 1818, and was in the 77th year of his age. He resided here until about twenty years ago, and as a boy and man had many friends who deplore his tragic death and sympathize with his relatives in their affliction. For the past thirty years he has been in the continuous employ of the Carnegie Steel Company and at the time of his death was at the head of the department in which he was employed. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Hattie Robinson, whom he married in this place, and one daughter who is married and resides in Pittsburg. He is also survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. C. Zahn, and his sister, Mrs. Mary of H. and Mary, all of Ebersburg; and by six sisters—Mrs. Maggie, wife of County Treasurer F. H. Barker, of Ebersburg; Mrs. Mary Jones, of Pittsburg; Mrs. Katie, wife of Judge Barker; Mrs. Alice, wife of Webster Griffith, and Mrs. Hattie, wife of A. Buck, of Ebersburg; Mrs. Amelia, wife of W. Wherry, of Altoona.
