

GOLD RESERVE SAFE.

Bond Syndicate Places \$1,350,000 in the Sub-Treasury.

MAKING GOOD THE CONTRACT

To Reimburse the Treasury for Gold Withdrawn for Shipment to Europe. The sum of \$900,000 taken from the Sub-Treasury for shipment.

New York, Aug. 14.—The government bond syndicate has deposited at the sub-treasury \$1,350,000 in gold in exchange for legal tenders.

This action is taken in pursuance of the syndicate's policy to reimburse the treasury for gold withdrawn therefrom for shipment to Europe.

A Washington special says: A telegram has been received at the treasury department from Assistant United States Treasurer Jordan at New York stating that \$900,000 in gold has been withdrawn for export to Europe. This was followed by a few minutes another stating that the Morgan syndicate had deposited in gold in exchange for legal tenders \$1,350,000, which leaves the gold reserve at the close of the day's business \$101,825,125.

The syndicate's action is taken here as conclusive evidence that it proposes to keep the reserve above the \$100,000,000 point, according to the spirit of its contract with the government.

ENGLAND'S VIGOROUS ACTION.

A Demand on Chinese Mandarins to Stop the Hoarding Investigation Commission.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—An official telegram has been received in London announcing that the Peking government, at the suggestion of the British minister, Mr. O'Connor, has issued a peremptory edict calling upon the governors of all the provinces in the empire to prevent the people from hoarding rice by idle rumors calculated to excite anti-mission disorders. Five of the participants in the Ku-cheng outrages have been arrested and will be tried forthwith.

A Shanghai special says: Mr. Mansfield, the British consul at Chungking, Mr. Allen, the British vice consul at Padoga Island, Colonel J. Courtenay Hixon, the United States consul at Fong Tsing, and other British consuls at various points in the interior, and Mr. Gregory and one of the lieutenants of the United States cruiser Detroit, have started on a mission to the provinces in order to make a complete inquiry into the matter. The consular party is escorted by a detachment of 100 Chinese troops, the victory having refused to allow an escort of foreign soldiers or marines to accompany them.

SILVER ISSUE NOT DEAD.

Senator Vest Talks on the Money Question at Carlsbad.

CARLSBAD, Aug. 14.—"The silver question will never be dropped in America until free coinage is passed," Senator Vest said at Carlsbad, Missouri, replying to questions put to him by a reporter concerning the Missouri, Mississippi and Iowa conventions.

LIKE HOLMES' VICTIMS.

Boys Die at the Home of a Woman for Whom They Were Insured.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—A negro boy, Campbell, and a white boy, William, both aged 12, died here under circumstances so suspicious that the coroner decided upon an inquest, which resulted in the holding of the inquest to the grand jury. The evidence showed that the boys were insured for their lives at the home of a woman, who was also insured for her own life. The fact was also developed that the boys' father, who also lived with the woman, had been insured for his life by the same woman.

A Farmer Shoots Three Foreigners.

MIDDLEBORO, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Three foreigners having three trained bears lumbered around Farmer James Melcomb's place in front of Summitville, N. Y., at dark Mr. Melcomb ordered them away. They refused to go when procuring a shotgun, Mr. Melcomb then fired three shots into the party. Two of the men died before reaching Summitville, and one is dying, while the third is not seriously injured. Farmer Melcomb gave himself up.

No Bounty Decision Expected Soon.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Comptroller Bowler says that he does not expect to act on the sugar bounty claim of the Chateau de France company until September. He has been waiting for the decision of the Treasury on the subject of the company's claim for bounty on sugar. The company's claim is for \$300,000 on sugar imported from France.

Will Watch For the Japs.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The bureau of investigation has information that a company has been formed in Japan for the purpose of sending Japanese laborers to this country under contract. The company is known as the "Kobayashi" company and is headed by a Japanese official. The bureau is watching for the company's activities.

Coppley Will Return East.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—General Coppley, who has been at Jackson's Hole with four troops of cavalry, has notified the commandants of his regiments that he will return to the east. He is leaving tomorrow to return to his headquarters at Omaha.

Sues the Choctaw Nation.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—James Coleman, attorney for the Choctaw Nation of Arkansas, has filed in the circuit court a claim for \$300,000 against the Choctaw Nation of Indians. Coleman claims that the nation owes him money for services rendered.

Two Youthful Burglars.

SAVANNAH, Aug. 14.—Ernest Kohbe and Robert Hoxley, two white boys, aged 12 years, were found guilty of burglary and were sentenced to two years in the penitentiary.

A Wealthy Lawyer Drops Dead.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—Walter Matlock, a wealthy lawyer of this city, has dropped dead at the Calumet club.

Woman Assaulted by a Negro.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 14.—A man supposed to be a negro broke into the residence of Mrs. Luther Lough, who belongs to one of the most prominent families in the city, near Independence, and beat up her son. The man was arrested and is being held for trial.

Wages of 2,000 Men Raised.

Maceo Writes an Encouraging Letter From Cuba.

REBELS ARE WINNING VICTORIES.

The Spanish Soldiers Are Panic-Stricken. A Republican Government Established. Campos Likely to Throw Up His Command—Spanish Soldiers Dying.

New York, Aug. 14.—Favorable accounts of the progress of the revolution have been received by General Maceo from Cuba. Maceo has written an encouraging letter from Cuba, saying that the revolution is making rapid progress and that the Spanish soldiers are panic-stricken. He says that the republicans are winning victories everywhere and that a republican government is likely to be established. He also says that General Campos is likely to throw up his command and that Spanish soldiers are dying.
