Obituary. BROWN.—Died at his home, the Central Hotel, in Ebensburg, on Friday morning, November 1st, 1895, at the age of 84 years, in the 43rd year of his age.

His mother, who is seventy-eight years old, was married to Henry Brown in 1828, and in the fall of 1870, when the deceased was seven years old, his parents moved to Cambria county, where they lived until 1885.
