BROWN. - Died at his home, the Central Hotel, in Ebersburg, on Friday morning, November 1st, 1895, Mr. Patrick F. Brown,

n the 43 year of his age. Mr. Brown was born in Johnstown on June 25, 1853, he being the seventh of a family of seven children. His mother, who is seventy-eight years old, was married to Henry Brown in 1828, and in the fall of 1870, when the deceased was seventeen years old, his parents moved to Cambria township, where they lived until 1895. They then moved back to Johnstown, leaving their sons Joseph and Patrick on the Cambria township farm, and they continued to reside in Johnstown until 1878, when they moved to Wilmore, where the father-Henry Brown-died, at the age of eighty-four years. In 1881 the subject of this sketch moved into the Central Hotel, Ebensburg, of which he became proprietor, and in which, with the exception of one year, he remained until his

On January 13, 1877, Mr. Brown was married to Charlotte O'Hara, and to this union were born seven children, two of them dying in infancy. His wife died October 22, 1888, and after five years of single life, Mr. Brown united in marriage with Matilda McKensie, in 1893. To this second wife, who survives him, were born two children. He is survived by seven children: Victoria, aged eighteen years; May, fifteen; Hugh, thirteen; Conrad, eleven; Reardon, eight; Harry, one year and ten months, and Sheldron, five months. Besides these he is survived by his aged mother, who lives in Wilmore; two brothers-Joseph and Henry-the former residing in Ebensburg, the latter in Morrellville, and two sisters-Mrs. David Gates, of Lower Yoder, and Mrs. Andrew Sarlouis, of Johnstown. Two Sisters-Mrs. Adolphus Jones and Mrs. John Hileman-

preceded him to the grave. Mr. Brown was born of Catholic parents, and he was, till the time of his death, a consistant member of that church. He was a kind son to his mother, a loving husband and father to his family, and to all who knew him a true friend, obliging neighbor, and a true citizen.


