Carlisle Says Its the Evil of Our Currency System.

FRESHWATER SHOULD BE VOTED ON.

He Says the People Ought to Decide Our Financial Policy Permanently, So as to Finally Establish Confidence—Addressed New York Business Men.

New York, Nov. 20.—The one hundred and twenty-seventh annual banquet of the chamber of commerce of the state of New York was held at Delmonico's last evening. Secretary Carlisle spoke on "Our Currency System."

"Two years ago, at your annual banquet, I said that the disposition and ability of the government to maintain its own credit at the highest standard and to preserve the integrity of all the forms of currency in circulation among the people could not be reasonably doubted and ought not to be the subject of further controversy."

"The fundamental vice in our currency system is not in the government and reasonable under the law. There are other defects, but this threatens the stability of the whole system of our currency."

"No change made in our currency system will set at naught the vitalities for the retirement of the legal tenders. The circulation of legal tenders is the foundation of our credit and out of the country the very origin of the government is compelled to redeem them; and it has expelled millions of dollars from our country."

"While the preliminary loss to which the people have been subjected by the issue and continued circulation of legal tender has been almost incalculable, this matter has not been the only one connected with the currency system."

"The national currency is a free coinage of legal tender silver is predicted upon the same vicious principle that underlies the legislation of paper money."
