HEAVIER EXPORTATIONS FEARED

No Remedy Vet, as the New Bond Issue Sannot Be Closed For 30 Days-The Reserve New Down to \$58,326,710, Likely to Go Much Lower.

Washington, Jan 8 - The treasury has lost \$2 163,000 in gold bars, and \$1,096,000 in gold coin, and received from the Mercantile National bank of New York \$500,000 in exchange for currency, making the net loss for the day \$2,759,000. This leaves the true amount of the reserve at the close of business \$5: 326.710. In financial circles here the fear is expressed that these heavy withdrawals are but the beginning of heavy exportations. It is recalled that during last Januabout \$45,000,000, of which \$10,000,000

ary the withdrawals [amounted to were withdrawn within two weeks, and over \$7,000,000 in one day. The fact that o days must clapse before the new bond issue can be closed, and the contracts awarded seems to add to the auxiety heretofore felt, and in some quarters the opinion is expressed that before the 1st of February arrives the gold reserve will have been reduced considerably below any point it has reached hitherto.

A New York special says: Considerable indecision has been manifested by some of the gold shipping houses, and additional orders have been given. The actual amount to be shipped today is \$2,725,000, and this total is below previous estimates. It is currently be lieved that the exports for the waek will exceed \$5,000,000.

HAVANA HAS NOT FALLEN.

The Country Outside the City Abandoned HAVANA. Jan. 8.—The insurgents are still in the vicinity of Havana, but their movements are not of sufficient importance to chronicle in detail. The

number of insurgents at Managua and Carabazar, 14 miles from this city, has been increased, but it is now believed that Havana itself will not be attacked for some time to come. The statement that Havana had fallen was false. Campos resignation is also denied. The influx of refugees from the whole of the territory surrounding Havan continues, and apparently it is not posible to obtain sufficient means of transportation to accommodate the flee ing families and their household goods The country seems to be entirely abandened to the insurgent army, and no

The intelligence from Cuba is of such an alarming character that some surprise is expressed, even by officials, that no word comes to the government as to the situation.
