SHOULDN'T MISUSE OUR FOWER.

The United States Should Try to Be an International Arbiter-The President's Message Invites Lots of Trouble-Interesting Address to Lawyers.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 22 .- Hon, Chauncev M. Depew's address on "Patriotism and Jingcism-The Lawyer's Duty" before the State Bar association, was a notable effort. In part, he said :

"The events of the past few weeks have demonstrated how easy it is to arouse the fighting blood among our own people. A generation has come upon the stage since the civil war who are eager for battle.

"Now is the time for the legal profession to perform a great work upon the lines of the lawyers of the centuries in promoting international arbitration. The present dispute between the English-speaking races which is agitating the world calls for both practical wisdom and legal acumen for its solution. There is no dissent in this country from the Monroe doctrine as promulgated by President Monroe and interpreted by Jefferson, Madison, Webster and Calhoun.

"Yet anyone who studies the Monroe doctrine will see how, in each individual case, excent where there is a flagrant violation like the French invasion of Mexico, the applicable interpretation of it should be the subject of judicial determination. The president's message to congress presents a novel view of the principle. If there is a dispute as to the bandary line between a South American republic and a European power, no matter how insignificant the territory involved or how distantly it affects the independence of the country or how remotely it may interest us, we must demand that the two governments arbitrate the line, and if they refuse, we must find out, as best we can, what the line is and enfore it by war. If, however, pending our inquiry, the two parties agree, we have no further rights or dutics. This seems to surrender the doctrine, if Venezuela or Brazil chooses to sell a portion of its territory,

A slight extention of the principle compels us to assume a protectorate over all these republies. Their enterprises and industries are almost entirely owned or controlled and carried on by Americans, English, Germans, French and Italians. Their governments are in almost perpetual revolu-tion, and the military dictator of the hour confiscates property right and left. except that of foreigners. If he could rely upon the United States to protect him, he would treat the foreigners the same way, and at his whim we would be continually in troable with foreign countries demanding reparation. 

With all the world in arms against us, the vast interior of our continent, except in its industrial and economic phases, would know nothing of the trouble and never see a foreign uniform-except on a prisover of war. Secure in our isolation, supreme in our resources, uncounled in our reserves and free from dangerous neighbors, we occupy among the nations of the globe a position so exalted and safe that to compare us with other countries would be absurd. 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
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
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
