The "drivers" at Robertsdale slope struck on Tuesday because one of their number had a different mode to drive, and the slope has been closed since. On Saturday morning the Woodvale shaft "drivers" refused to work through sympathy and now all the mines are closed. The mines had only been working two days a week and the "drivers" struck just as they began working on a large order which would have kept them steadily employed. -Huntingdon News.

Leroy Harris, a young Phoenix telephone lineman, met with an accident in Altoona Monday morning which will render him a cripple for life. He was mounting a sixty foot pole at the alley corner of the Phoenix block on Elvengrove street by means of spikes driven into the pole at regular intervals, and when above the first cross bar, about thirty feet above the pavement, he slipped on one of the spikes and was precipitated to the street. In falling he made futile efforts to catch the spikes and sprained his wrist. Harris landed on his feet. The impact with the pavement shattered his right knee cap and will make him a cripple for life. A ligament of his knee is also injured.

There is consternation among the male portion of Centre county school teachers. When the county directors met in annual convention they passed resolutions denouncing the use of tobacco in any form by the teachers, and indorsed the law prohibiting the use of the same. They also demanded that in the future no superintendent enforce on every one the law, whether or not the holder is a user of tobacco in any form. The directors are now quietly investigating to find out how many of the teachers use tobacco, with a view of demanding that they either quit it or be removed from office. As a good many of the male teachers either chew or smoke when not engaged in teaching, they are greatly alarmed.

Albert J. Williams, a native of Ebensburg, died at his home in Homestead, Pa., on Saturday evening from complications of disease which baffled all medical skill. Mr. Williams was the son of the late Thomas J. Williams, who died in this place about three years ago and Mrs. Susan Williams who still resides here. He is survived by his wife, who has been in ill health for about ten years ago and four children, three sons and one daughter. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. J. G. Hassler, wife of the editor of this paper, and three brothers, Robert J., of Denver, Colorado; George, of Ebensburg; and William, of Altoona. Mr. Williams was a member of the Catholic church and was buried in the Catholic cemetery at Homestead on Tuesday morning after a High Mass of Requiem in the Catholic church at that place.

Death of Tilton J. Coffey.

Hon. Tilton J. Coffey died suddenly of heart disease in Washington, on Monday, aged seventy-eight years. Mr. Coffey was born in Indiana, Pa. After finishing his college course he studied law with the late Attorney General Bates, of Missouri. After his admission to the bar he practiced law in Indiana for several years and during that time was a frequent visitor to Ebensburg in attendance at our courts. He was elected to the state senate in 1855 and served until 1859, when he removed to Pittsburgh and practiced his profession until the inauguration of President Lincoln in 1861, when his predecessor, Judge Bates, was appointed attorney general, who appointed Mr. Coffey as assistant attorney general, which position he held during Lincoln's administration. When Governor Curtin was appointed minister to Russia, Mr. Coffey was appointed Secretary of Legation and accompanied Mr. Curtin to Russia. After his return he practiced law in Washington until about ten years ago when he retired to enjoy an ample fortune which he had acquired. For several years he has been spending the summer seasons in this place and a couple of years ago he purchased a commanding piece of ground on the outskirts of the town in which he erected one of the finest summer residences in the neighborhood and which he expected to occupy the coming summer. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. John Chew, of Washington.

A Native of Cambria.

"In noting the advent of the new county officials, a word in favor of the old is in order. Mr. J. A. Kennedy, the retiring Register of Deeds, has become one of the best and most efficient officers that Nobles county has ever had. He has always been prompt and accurate in the discharge of his duties and obliging to those doing business with him.
