

Fish Distribution.

Persons who wish to secure fish from the tate for breeding purposes or are interested in the matter would do well to read the rules which the Pennsylvania commission of fisheries have made for the distribution of the same.

To begin with, the state has been divided nto six districts and all applications for blanks for fish must be sent to the commissioner of the district in which the ap dicant resides. The application, when received, must be endorsed by the senator or representative of the district, after which it is to be forwarded to the commisdoner, who will approve and then forward t to the hachery to be filled.
