### Some Rare Old Records

Many interesting old documents are beng found in the sorting out and boxing up now going on in the Westmoreland connty court house, preparatory to tearing it down so that a new building may be erected on the present site.

Among them are records showing the ownership of slaves and considerable proprty in what then constituted the county country was very much like wealthy men of to-day. Early in 1786 George sold the property of John Johns for a debt of £25, s, and 6d. Johns resided in what is now Fayette county. The penmanship, although not up to the system now in vogue, was nearly executed, most of the old reords having been done by Arthur St. lair, who was Westmoreland's first probonotary, clerk of courts, in fact, nearly very other court officer, as well.

Many of these old books, particularly the old diaries, kept by the fathers in the ounty's early days, contain much matter infit for publication. Public documents. written by King George, the Penns, and other men of rank both in the colonies and England, are to be found in the records of the county's early days.


