A New Industry for Bellefon'e.

The announcement is made of a new inndustry for Bellefonte which is to be started within the next two weeks. It will se a plant for the manufacture of Acetyene gas and tanks for production of same. This is a new discovery on the market and if it meets with the success expected, the stablishing of a plant at that place will nean a big thing for Bellefonte.

There is only one factory of the kind in the country and that is located at Nigara, Falls, N. Y., and is operated by the company ex-Secretary of the Navy William C Whitney, is at the head of, Acetylene gas is of comparatively re-

ent discovery and is made from the chemical action of water upon bicarbonate of lime. The bicarbon is produced through the fusion of bituminous coal, lime, and everal other ingredients by means of an dectrical current. It is the principal agent in generating gas and is suspended in a basket in a small galvanized iron tank To generate gas by this process three tanks are used. One filled with water, one holding the basket containing the bicarbon and the other being the receiver selfoul, anughter of Mr. and for the gas. It can be consumed through the ordinary gas ixtures now in buildings, by merely adding the three tanks mentioned above. The carbide will be placed on the market n solid form and people who have the fixures can add the tanks, buy the carbide nd generate the gas for themselves.
