There was, how ever, a continuation of the contests for the different places on the state ticket and for positions on the committees. Lawrence T, Neal, who was defeated for governor by President McKinley, ex-Mayor John Farley and other gold tandard Democrats, were active in the chorus for McLean, but they were contending for different men for governor. Robert T. Hough was again the favorite and regarded as the McLean man, but the field made a very bitter fight on him, especially the friends of ex-Congressman Paul J. Sorg, who was supported by ex-Governor James E. Campceli, ex-Collector Joseph Dowling, who was removed by President Cleveland for violation of the civil service rules, and other leading conservatives on the financial question. The fact that Mr. Sorg voted for the issue of gold bonds while in congress was used by the radical silver men very strongly against

In the contest for governor John C. Weny and Horace L. Chapman showed much strength. Even if the McLean men insist on putting through the Hough slate it is believed that there will be several ballots in order to permit the dozen or more candidates to show their respective polis. If there are many candidates for other

places on the state ticket, and the convention may extend to tomorrow. After the meetings of the delegates by districts there was a movement to bring out a new man for governor, one who had not been involved in the complications of the past few days, and General A. J. Warner, president of the National Bimetallic League, and one of the original silver advocates in congress, was most prominently mentioned as the dark horse. General Warner has been here all week and is regarded as a receptive candidate for governor.

THE BUANISH ARE NERVOUS. Feat the United States May Use Force. Weyler to Be Recalled.

LONDON, June 30.—The Pall Mall Gazette prints the following dispatch from its correspondent at Madrid: "Public attention is engrossed by the appointpointment of General Stewart L. Woodford as United States minister to Spain. While the government continues to repudiate the intention of recalling General Weyler, I am in a position to reiterate that his recall will be an accomplished fact at no distant date. I learn that in all possibility Generals Blanco

and Macias will proceed to the island and divide the supreme command, and I have good reason to believe that coincident with the arrival of General Woodford, Marshal Martinez Campos will proceed upon a separate mission to "In accordance with the wishes of

President McKinley, Martinez Campos should be the executor of any arrangements possibly reached between Spain and the United States. Indications do not point to any arrangements being reached with the United States and intimate friends of Senor Canovas del Castillo, the Spanish premier, declare the premier will strenuously oppose autonomy. Castelar, the Liberal leader, is also opposed to anything of the kind. They both consider that such a concession would render it very difficult to maintain Spanish sovereignty.

"The report that the United States will insist upon autonomy and the withdrawal of the Spanish troops and that otherwise it will intervene by force if necessary does not make for a peaceful solution, and the position is regarded throughout Spain with considerable anxiety."

## BANNOCKS OUT AGAIN.

The Troublesome Idaho Indians Leave Their Reservation - White Settlers Scared-An Appeal Made For United

States Troops-Ordered Brought Back, Washington, June 30.-Regarding the request of the Idaho people for troops to protect them against the Baunocks Secretary Alger has held a consultation with Acting Adjutant General Breck and some of the other officers who are experienced in just such Indian troubles as this, and the conclusion reached was that the department should take steps to learn for itself the exact situation in the Fort Hall country. Accordingly a telegram was sent to Brigadier General Coppinger at Omaha, Neb., the headquarters of the department of the Platte, in which the reservation is included, instructing him to send one or more officers to the scene of trouble to ascertain and report upon the state of affairs there.

The news of the outbreak of Indians from the reservation came in dispatches from the governor of Idaho. He telegraphed Secretary Bliss and wized urgent messages to Senator Heitfeld. Senators Heitfeld and Shoup immediately went to the interior department where they called attention to the situation, and the dispatches also were promptly forwarded to the secretary of war. Secretary Bliss carried the telegrams to the cabinet meeting, where

they were discussed. A formal communication also was nade to the secretary of war asking that orders be issued for whatever military assistance may be necessary to aid the agent, Lieutenant F. G. Irwin, U. S. A., in preserving order and protecting the lives and property of the settlers and to return the Indians to their reservations if they are absent therefrom as reported. The agent was notified to make a further immediate report.

## A FREE MONONGAHELA.

The Gevernment Ready to Pay the Cash

For the Locks. Washington, June 30. - Attorney General McKenna has rendered an opinion upon the Monongahela river question which was asked for by the secretary of war. He decided that the title is clear and that condemnation procedings heretofore had are valid. The acquiring of the locks and dams in the Monongahela river was provided for in the last river and narbor bill and under its terms there have been condemnation proceedings. The condemn. ation has been made and has not been appealed from.

The decision of the attorney general removes all existing legal complications and the only thing remaining to secure free navigation of the Monongahela river is for the payment to the Monongahela Navigation company of the amounts judged to be due by the commissioners making the condemnaproceedings. With this object in view the secretary of war has telegraphed the officers of the company to come to Washington so that the deal may be closed and the money paid to the company.

PRESIDENT TO VISIT CANTON. He Will Spend the Fourth of July With His Mother.

Washington, June 30.—The president has definitely decided to go to his visit his mother for a few days. Mrs. McKinley, Miss Mabel McKinley and probably Assistant Secretary of State and Mrs. Day will accompany him. They will leave here on the regular train over the Pennsylvania railroad Friday evening at 7:10, arriving in Cauton at 10:30 Saturday morning. They will remain over the Fourth and return Monday or Tuesday evening. On Thursday night the president will give an informal dinner to the members of the cabinet and their wives.

Lit Visited the Senate. Washington, June 30 .- Ex-Queen Liluokalani of the Hawaiian Islands spent some time in the private gallery of the senate, accompanied by three members of her suite. NEW YORK, June 30.-The jury in the case of the officers of the American Tobacco company, indicted for conspiracy in restraint of trade, reported that they were unable to agree. They were thereupon discharged. It is understood that ten of the jurors were for convictions and two for acquittal.

Fitz and Sullivan Can't Box. New York, June 30.—Superintendent McKelvey of the Brooklyn police stated that he will not permit the proposed contest between Bob Fitzsimmons and John L. Sullivan to take place July 5.

Old Hoss Hoey Dead. New York, June 30.—Actor William F. Hoev (Old Hoss) has died at the home of his mother-in-law in this city of paresis.

Richards Made Solicitor General. Washington, June 30.—The president has sent the following nomination to the senate: John K. Richards of Francisco, Sacramento, St. Louis and Ohio to be solicitor general.

SOME EXPENSE BILLS PASSED.

Crothers Put an Amendment Into One Measure Which Helped it Through In the House-Criminal Libel Bill Acted Upon-Work of the Lawmakers.

HARRISBURG, June 30 .- The general appropriation bill, after being read for the second time, has been recommitted to the appropriations commmittee for amendments in the senate. Some 85 house appropriation bills went through on second reading.

The bill relating to criminal libel, as amended, passed finally, after some discussion, by a vote of 37 to 1, the single vote in the negative being that of Mr.

Mr. Flinn rose to a question of privlege to deny the reports that he had made a deal with Senator Quay on the question of legislation. Mr. Magee made a similar denial.

the expenses of the investigation of the insurance scandal was defeated on final passage by a vote of 99 to 22. When the bill appropriating \$1,925 to Sergeant-at-Arms Wyatt, for services in the Saunders-Roberts contest from the third Philadelphia was taken up for al passage. Mr. Crothers (Philadelphia moved to go into committee of the whole to insert the following

amendment: "That it shall not be lawful for the auditor general to approve nor the state trea-urer to pay any bills or parts thereof for extra carfare, carriage hire, eping berths, telegrams, telephone charges and other expenses, until after a duly sworn and fully itemized statement of expenses actually incurred shall have been duly filed with the auditor general and such sworn statement shall se accompanied with vonchers covering every item of expenditure." The amendment was inserted by a

vote of 106 to 46 and the report of the committee adopted. Mr. Carothers' amendment was also inserted in the bill appropriating \$405 to pay Mr. Wyatt for his expensees incurred by the senate and house ia attending the auguration of President McKinley, and \$811 for services in the Shiffer-Leh contest.

The vote by which the expense bili of the committee to investigate the insurance scandal was defeated was reonsidered, and the bill passed finally. The civil service bill was defeated by a vote of 55 to 93. The vote by which the capital fire inquiry expense bill was defeated was reconsidered, and the measure passed finally.

TO CONTROL THE TRUSTS. Republicans Agree on an Amendment. The Duty on Coal.

Washington, June 30.-The Repub lican members of the senate committee on judiciary have had under consideration the form of an amendment to be submitted for the control of trusts. old home at Canton, O., on Friday to They practically agreed upon an amendment making it an offense punishable by fine and imprisonment for any person or corporation to monopolize or conspire with any other person or corporation to monopolize the trade in any article protected by the tariff bill. Th amendment when completed will prescribe penalties and supply directions for the detection of fraud. The preparation of the amendment has been referred to a sub-committee consisting of

Messrs. Thurston, Davis and Spooner. The senate finance committee has fixed the duty on coal at 67 cents per long ton. This rate applies only to coal shipped from countries which do not impose a higher rate on American coal. It therefore affects only Canada. the Canadian rate on American coal beng the same. There has been a strong contention to hold the rate down to that originally fived by the committee and even to lower it, but this effort was vigorously contested by the senators from the coal producting states, and the latter class have won.

CHANDLER AND TILLMAN. They Had a Lively and Amnsing Colloquy In the Senate.

Washington, June 30 .- A lively and amusing colloquy has occurred in the senate between Senators Tillman of South Carolina and Chandler of New Hampshire. The former had proposed an amendment to the tariff bill, providing a \$100 head tax on immigrants and a restriction against all those not coming to the United States to become

citizens. Mr. Tillman made an earnest speech on the depressed condition of labor, but he was soon diverted from his theme by Mr. Chandler. The latter, adopting a style of mock gravity, directed the discussion to Mr. Cleveland's administration. This, in turn, brought from Mr. Tillman a vehement criticism of the late president, while Mr. Chandler drolly protested against the assaults on Mr. Cleveland by a member of his own party. When the fun had been fast and furious for some time the Tillman amendments were defeated. Yeas, 3; nays, 48, the three affirmative votes being cast by Messes. Butler, Quay and

PROBABLY DONE FOR REVENGE. The Scrantan Explosion Not Caused by

Accident-Several Injured. SCRANTON, Pa., June 30 .- The dynamite explosion in South Scranton blew up the business block of Leon Olchofski, a double dwelling owned by him and a detached house owned by Michael O'Hara. The business block, a twostory building, was torn to pieces, Twenty other houses had all the windows blown out and plaster torn from the walls. The shock was felt all over

the city. Olchofski was seriously injured in saving his wife and his recovery is doubtful, Following the explosion the wrecked buildings took fire, but the firemen kept the flames from spreading. The infant child of Michael Joyce was dangerously injured and a little son of John Klein almost suffocated. The total loss will reach \$25,000.

Olchofski has been in political and church wrangles for a number of years and was the recognized leader of one of the warring factions among the South Side Polanders. When asked if he thought it possible that some enemy had blown up his store he said he did not know what to think, it might be that, but he would not like to say anything about it. Nobody could be found who could

explain the cause of the disaster. Circumstantial evidence abounds, however, to show that it was no accident. Gas could not have wrought such havoc nor could it have been caused by any ordinary amount of dynamice or glycerin. Olckofski was arrested later, accused

of arson.

NO STRIKE OF MINERS. President Ratchford Says He Is Weary Denying It. COLUMBUS, June 30.-Michael Ratchford, president of the United Mineworkers of America, when aslal what if any truth were in the specals sent out to the effect that a strike of coal workers had been ordered, said:

"I am tired of denying these reports of a proposed strike. I have been denying them for 60 days. I have nothing to say for publication." The last national meeting of the miners decided on a scale of 60 cents for Ohio and 69 cents for Pennsylvania and left it to the executive committee to determine the time to put the scale into operation. The committee met here June 24, 25 and 26, and for three days were closeted with positive orders not to be called or to admit anybody. Later they gave out that conditions are not favorable to put the proposed new scale into operation now. That, of course, means that there might have been a strike had the new scale been ordered, but not being ordered there cannot be any strike.

OFFICIALS NOT EXEMPT.

A Cleveland Judge Seut Major Stock man to Jail. CLEVELAND, June 30 .- It appears that officials of the United States government must obey the order of courts whether they are engaged in government business when summoned or not. Some time ago Major W. B. Stockman

of the weather bureau was fined for

failing to answer a summons to appear as a witness before Judge Ong. Failing to pay he was committed to jail, but was almost immediately released. He appealed to Washington and Judge Ong suspended the fine until Stockman could hear from the government. Stockman has just received a letter from Secretary Wilson advising him to pay the fine. Judge Ong feels vindicated and is disposed to let Stockman off with the costs.

NAVAL MILITIA DRILLS.

Assistant Secretary Rosevelt Will Watch Ohio and Michigan Tars.

Washington, June 30 .- Acting Sec retary Roosevelt has practically com pleted the program for the summer drills of the naval militia. The militia of the states bordering on the lakes will be taken care of by the Michigan. Mr. Roosevelt himself will attend some of the drills, leaving here next Friday for Cleveland. The dates for the drills were fixed as follows:

The Michigan militia will be drilled at Bay City and Detroit from July 10 to 18. The Ohio militia will take its turn at Cleveland and Toledo from July 21 to 31 and the Illinois militia will be met at Chicago Aug. 9 to 16.
